ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 1938

INTRODUCTION

With the close of this fiscal year of 1938 nearly 20 years have elapsed since the armistice of November 11, 1918. These intervening years have witnessed the birth of a new pension and insurance system for the veterans of the World War; the initiation, development, and termination of a vocational training program; the allowance and payment of adjusted compensation; the inauguration of pensions for the World War group through disability allowance and its subsequent curtailment; the development of a vast hospital program; the enactment, modification, revocation, and simplification of laws governing veterans' relief and changes in organization and practices; experiments, some of them, tried in the fire of experience—efforts, all of them, to meet the problem of some four million men and women who gave their youth to the service of their country and from that service through subsequent years finding themselves in need of assistance, which a Nation has gratefully extended.

The days of experiments in World War veterans' legislation have passed with the increased knowledge gained through the years of the scope and importance of this problem. Perhaps some few inequalities and inconsistencies still exist to be eliminated, but for the most part it appears as the twentieth anniversary of the armistice approaches that, at least for those veterans who were disabled in service, their benefits and rights have been fixed and their security within these rights assured.

But there remains the problem of what security or promise of livelihood may be given aside from medical care to that great number of living veterans of the World War who were not disabled in service and who may not come within the scope of benefits accorded by the Social Security Act.

With the average age of World War veterans increasing year by year, with resultant disability, diminishing earning power, and employment opportunity, impetus is naturally given to movements designed to afford them increased security. So we find throughout the deliberations of veteran groups and among those interested in veterans' affairs, proposals made and questions raised regarding service pensions for the World War veteran group, and as employment opportunity seems increasingly denied to our male citizens over 40, there is heard a rallying cry of jobs or pensions. Such a slogan is natural to any group concerned with their economic independence, as is their expectation that steps be taken to provide reasonable assistance and security for those among them who need care and livelihood.

For those veterans who now or who later will need care, the Federal Government has with increasing celerity provided, or approved plans for providing, adequate hospital and domiciliary facilities. We look to there being available 100,000 beds within perhaps 10 years. This is the construction goal, and this number it is believed will suffice to meet needs within our present laws. No greater benefit has been provided for our veterans than that of hospitalization, providing as it does excellent care when one is ill or can no longer carry on. It is well known that under the pressure of adverse economic conditions, hospitalization and domiciliary care increase.

There should be no impairment to the progress of this provision, but in providing and maintaining a service of such widely recognized value to those who benefit from it a material cost factor must necessarily be involved. As an example, our experience shows that the average cost of providing a bed through the construction of a new hospital approximates \$4,000, to equip it \$400, and to operate it about \$950 a year. Thus in the accomplishment of the future program of hospitalization and hospital construction extensive and increasing expenditures will annually be involved.

It is believed that through the development of the present extensive hospitalization program and with a vigorously pursued campaign for the development and maintenance of employment opportunity for veterans not now successfully employed, much can be done to relieve any economic stringency which may obtain among our less-fortunate World War veterans and thus make less important any contemporary consideration among these veterans for an extension of other forms of benefit, any program for which it is generally recognized should be approached most carefully. Surely any material additional benefits which may be sought will be considered in the light of benefits already granted. By all means it is important that the Federal program of veterans' hospitalization be protected and, therefore, it is incumbent upon all those interested, whether they be Federal agencies, service organizations, or civic groups, to bend every effort to meet the economic needs which will increasingly obtain among World War veterans by getting them and keeping them in employment consistent with their several capacities. Employment opportunity today is the most important problem in veterans' relief.

Organization.—Throughout this year there was continued the policy of consolidating field activities when this was possible without impairment from the standpoint of savings in operating costs. Of the 54 regional offices established under authority contained in the World War Veterans' Act of 1924, 36 have been consolidated with hospitals or homes, and during this year several additional mergers were authorized for future accomplishment. In addition, consolidation has been effected in the supply activities at seven stations, in finance activities at two, and in medical activities at one. It is roughly estimated that a saving of approximately 10 percent in operating costs is obtained in combining regional offices with hospitals or homes, and in total this recurring annual saving is of considerable amount. These savings are reflected largely in such items as salaries, miscellaneous medical fee services, supplies, telephone service, rentals, and miscellaneous contract services. The Administration is able to give equal or better service at combined facilities, with a minimum of administrative expense, because of the more extensive activities which are

immediately available to the veteran, especially in connection with his physical examination.

Decentralization.—In order to further take the service of the Government to its veteran claimants, in 1921 there was decentralized to the then district offices of the Veterans' Bureau the adjudication of World War veterans' claims, and there was vested in these offices the function of allowance and denial of claims for disability compensation. In 1924 this function was further decentralized to the regional offices following the enactment of the World War Veterans' Act, 1924, in keeping with the policy to take the service of the then Veterans' Bureau as near as possible to the veteran to be served. Field offices were appropriately staffed for this purpose.

Since that time and until July 1937 there remained centralized the adjudication of claims for pension of veterans of all other wars and claims for death benefits on account of veterans of all wars. Early in 1937 there was proposed by a major cooperating agency the decentralization of the adjudication of compensation claims of dependents of deceased veterans of the World War on the basis that it would expedite the settlement of these current claims. In order to test the possible advantages of such a decentralized procedure the Veterans' Administration in July 1937 inaugurated the decentralization of initial adjudicatory action for World War dependents' claims and claims for burial expenses and allowances by establishing appropriate procedures in eight of its field offices.

Studies of the results of this trial and partial decentralization were not conclusive that better or more expedited service resulted, but there was sufficient basis for believing that expedited service might result, so that shortly after the close of the reported year conclusion was reached to extend the experiment of decentralization to all field offices and to measure the resultant experience against records of achievement on a centralized basis. This complete decentralization of initial adjudication of World War dependent claims will be initiated on a trial basis early in the new calendar year of 1939 and results will be carefully studied to determine the relative efficiency of centralized and decentralized procedures in this field of service.

New hospital and domiciliary construction.—On June 7, 1937, the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs presented to the Federal Board of Hospitalization his views and recommendations on the matter of future policy regarding construction of hospital facilities for veterans. The policy thus outlined was approved by the Federal Board of Hospitalization on July 29, 1937, and by the President on September 20, 1937. Essentially, the new policy provides (a) for the acquisition of as many additional beds as may be required to meet the peak load of the N. P. group, by including each year under a separate appropriation heading sufficient funds to provide the anticipated number of beds at the time such estimates are submitted; (b) that no additional beds be provided specifically for tuberculous cases, except as may be necessary to correct unsatisfactory local conditions or deficiencies; and (c) that no general construction program be undertaken for the general medical and surgical group, but that additional beds for this type be provided in those areas where the available beds are disproportionate to the military population, such deficiencies to be met in part if possible through the use of other Government hospitals.

In furtherance of this policy the Administration during this year prepared and submitted to the Public Works Administration a new construction program designed to meet the expected increase for several years in the N. P. load as well as provide general beds in those areas where the existing accommodations were disproportionate to the military population. By approval of the President, the Veterans' Administration was successful in obtaining funds from this agency, and in June of this year the sum of \$13,268,000 was allotted for these purposes. The original program under this authority consisted of 22 projects in 18 States, including 2 new hospitals. Beds to be acquired totaled 5,635, distributed by types as follows: Neuropsychiatric, 3,423; general medical and surgical, 1,862; and domiciliary, 350. The original approval directed that all construction work be under way by August 15, 1938.

This allotment was in addition to the sum of \$4,500,000 made available to the Administration for new hospital and domiciliary construction by the regular appropriation, Public, No. 534, Seventy-fifth Congress, approved May 23, 1938.

Improved service in the medical care of beneficiaries.—The Veterans' Administration in maintaining its high standard of care and treatment of beneficiaries gives continuous study to the introduction of new diagnostic and treatment methods approved by the consensus of authoritative medical opinion, to the renovation or replacement of unserviceable equipment and supplies, and to the training of personnel.

During this fiscal year the surgical treatment by the several forms of so-called "collapse therapy" has been increasingly practiced, particularly at the nine chest surgery centers established in 1936 at Pittsburgh, Pa.; Castle Point, N. Y.; Hines, Ill.; Legion, Tex.; Oteen, N. C.; Portland, Oreg.; San Fernando, Calif.; Tucson, Ariz.; and Washington, D. C. Sufferers from pulmonary tuberculosis whose condition is not susceptible of improvement by the traditional medical treatment have been benefited by these operative procedures.

A considerable number of beneficiaries suffering from the distressing and rather common allergic disorders (including hay fever, asthma, sensitiveness to certain foods, etc.) have been relieved by the treatment methods taught and practiced at the special allergy clinic established at Pittsburgh, Pa., and available at other field stations.

For several years a large number of sufferers from general paralysis of the insane have received malaria inoculation and other types of heat therapy (diathermy) and a broad study is to be made, based upon this experience, in order to evaluate the results—as reflected in relative extramural social and industrial adjustment and in the mental and physical improvement in those requiring continuance of hospital care. Prior to the introduction of these methods of treatment, death from this disease was the invariable expectation after from 2 to 3 years of distressing symptoms.

Among patients suffering from dementia praecox or schizophrenia, the insulin treatment, introduced by Sakel, of Vienna, and the metrazol therapy, proposed by Meduna, have had and are having utilization under careful supervision. The fact, however, that the best results from these forms of treatment are to be expected when the disease is of comparatively recent onset, whereas the beneficiaries of the Veterans' Administration are in an average age group of 45 years and the

duration of their mental disorder is generally of longer duration, must be expected to influence results. An auxiliary measure of much value for demented patients is habit training, which has been progressively developed for several years by instructors selected for their patience, their understanding of and their sympathetic interest in such beneficiaries.

Occupational therapy, including principally outdoor projects reinforced by certain types of indoor workshop activities, has been practiced to an exceptional degree by the Veterans' Administration, and these treatment measures are augmented by diverse recreational opportunities. The spectacle of mental patients seated or standing, idle and dejected, upon the wards, has been reduced to a minimum. Every effort is made to get all such patients occupied and interested, so as to prevent introspection and to awaken that initiative and self-reliance which may and does often lead to hospital discharge and resumption of life in the general community.

Extensive use was made during the year of types of suction apparatus in the treatment of Buerger's disease and other vascular disorders of the extremities.

Medical research projects for the fiscal year included especially the clinical and laboratory study of convulsive disorders (epilepsy, etc.) at Northport, Long Island, N. Y., and work in diseases of the heart and blood vessels, the latter of which is a prominent cause of disability in beneficiaries. The cardiovascular research unit, located in the facility at Washington, D. C., provided a postgraduate course in heart disease, including electrocardiographic diagnosis, in November and December 1937, and the chief of that unit, visiting field stations, gave lectures and practical demonstrations in cardiology to medical staffs. Numerous technical aspects of disability from diseases of the heart and blood vessels are being studied by this unit.

The results of a study of silicosis, made in collaboration with Drs. Leroy U. Gardner and H. L. Sampson, of Saranac Lake, N. Y., were published. This study had particular value in view of the contemporaneous interest in this condition as affecting miners.

The tumor research unit at Hines, Ill., consisting of a research laboratory, clinical photography section, and registry and statistical section, is a valuable adjunct to the tumor clinic there, and numerous articles on the genesis and clinical and pathological features of cancer have been published from this unit.

To the already finely equipped and staffed tumor clinic, at Hines, Ill., was added a new 400-kilovolt X-ray machine for deep roentgen therapy. Other tumor clinics, supplied with radium element and deep X-ray machines, and with trained specialists in attendance, are provided for cancerous patients at the Veterans' Administration facilities in Washington, D. C., Bronx, N. Y., Atlanta, Ga., Portland, Oreg., and Los Angeles, Calif.

For several years diagnostic X-ray equipment has been developed along the lines of shock-proof, ray-proof designs, and has reached a state of comparative perfection. During this year the Veterans' Administration made a number of such installations.

In the field of high-tension diathermy equipment there has been for the past 2 years a strong tendency away from the so-called high-frequency equipment to the much higher frequency equipment referred to as short wave and ultra short wave. The marked superiority of

this equipment lies in its method of application, which is without metallic contact—the distance from the metal electrode of the applicator to the patients' skin ranging from the thickness of the insulation on the electrode (approximately $\frac{3}{8}$ inch) to several inches. This method of application permits treatment at much higher rates of dosage and at the same time minimizes the possibility of burns. Due to these factors the comfort of the patient is much enhanced and the work of the operator greatly facilitated.

The inevitable acceleration of retirements for disability or age in the older physicians in the service has focused attention for several years upon the recruiting of well-equipped young graduates in medicine. These associate physicians, before assignment to a field station, are given a 4-month training course, including medical administration and procedure.

The postgraduate courses for physicians already in the service were continued at the diagnostic centers located in Washington, D. C., Hines, Ill., and San Francisco, Calif. Training in specialties was provided at other facilities of the Veterans' Administration, or was arranged, at expense of the physicians concerned, in civilian hospitals and clinics. Seven physicians attended a 6-month course in pathology given at Columbia University, New York City.

New Legislation affecting World War dependents.—In order to forestall perhaps some suffering in the cases of thousands of dependent parents of World War veterans whose insurance would commence to expire in 1937, the Congress enacted Public Act No. 304, Seventy-fifth Congress. This act greatly increased the rates payable to parents, subsequent to the discontinuance of insurance installments, and also prior to discontinuance if the compensation being paid them and the insurance installments going forward did not equal or exceed the amount of compensation payable under this new act. Increases were also granted to World War widows at ages 50 and 65 in excess of those previously authorized.

The act also fixed the date of commencement of death benefits as the date following the date of death of a veteran, provided claim is filed within 1 year subsequent to death. This provision resulted in retroactive awards to widows, children, and parents in those instances where they did not apply for benefits immediately following the veteran's death. Another provision recognized reenlistment subsequent to November 11, 1918, as World War service, if the veteran had prior service between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918.

The increases provided under this act in the great majority of cases have been awarded automatically without necessity of filing a new claim by the beneficiary. In those cases where no compensation was being paid concurrently with insurance installments, notification of possible rights to compensation was furnished with the last insurance installment check. This action has resulted in the filling of a considerable number of claims by persons who had not previously filed claims, or whose claims had been previously disallowed.

Rating policy.—It has been the policy of the Veterans' Administration since its inception to apply the laws enacted by the Congress granting benefits to veterans and to their dependents by the broadest possible interpretation consistent with the spirit of these laws, to be as generous as possible consistent with the facts shown in every case in the evaluation of disability and, after careful consideration of all

the facts in the individual case, to resolve reasonable doubt in favor of the veteran or his dependent. With the passing of time it is only human that some, perhaps due to their individual experiences, may fail to give due regard to salient policies which should be of paramount importance in the accomplishment of their work. During the last fiscal year it was deemed advisable to formally reiterate this long-standing policy for the benefit of all concerned. This action has been taken with effective results. Rating agencies have also been advised of the necessity and fairness in according due weight to the character of the veteran's military or naval service, when considering the matter of service connection of his disabilities.

Permanent and total disability not of service origin.—The existence for some years past of large numbers of unemployed veterans with physical and mental disabilities varying in severity from negligible to obviously incapacitating, together with the increasing age of the veteran group, with its associated increase in disability from causes not related to the military service, combine to make the problem of permanent and total disability from causes not the result of service, one of great and growing importance. The wide variety of disabling conditions encountered, with widely varying ability to overcome the handicap of disability, has made it necessary to make determinations in this regard on an individual basis. Accordingly, if his disabilities meet certain numerical requirements, so as to substantiate their intrinsic severity, favorable determinations are made upon a finding that the disability has rendered the veteran unemployable, upon consideration of his age, occupational experience, and physical and mental adaptability.

As of June 30, 1938, 46,318 World War veterans were in receipt of the pension for permanent total disability, not the result of service, at the rate of \$30 per month. During the year close study was given to the problem, and for part of the time provision was made for reference to the Central Office for special study of all claims not permitting favorable determination under the regulations and rating schedule when the veteran or his representative so requested. The most striking fact apparent from this study has been the great number of influences, apart from the presence of disability and its severity, such as the factor of disability, which must be analyzed to account for unemployment in the individual case. The number of claims not permitting favorable determinations under existing regulations, but presenting any clear substantiation of the fact that disability, and not economic conditions, or the personal equation of the disabled person, was the cause of unemployment, was small. For these reasons no fundamental change in policy has been considered to be in order, although certain changes are being developed principally affecting disabilities characteristic of advancing age, and industrial accidents.

Enrollment of veterans for emergency conservation work—Employment.—The veterans' contingent of the Civilian Conservation Corps was established by Executive order in May 1933. Veterans were enrolled under the provisions of that order until the passage of the Civilian Conservation Corps Act on June 28, 1937.

The provisions of that act did not materially affect the policy and procedure made applicable in the selection of veterans for the veterans' contingent of the corps or the participation of the Veterans' Administration therein which had been in effect during the preceding 4 years.

The act, however, contained two important limitations of interest to veterans, namely, that the provisions thereof shall continue for a period of 3 years after July 1, 1937, and no longer, and that the maximum number of war veterans who might be enrolled in the corps at any one time was 30,000.

Further, the act authorized the President to utilize the services and facilities of such departments or agencies of the Government as he might deem necessary for carrying out the purposes of the act. In harmony with this provision the President by Executive order designated the Veterans' Administration as a cooperating agency which action gave it representation on the Director's Advisory Council.

The primary functions of the Veterans' Administration in this respect have been to determine the eligibility of applicants for membership in the veterans' contingent, to select from the eligible applicants the requisite number to maintain the authorized quota at full strength, and to certify such selectees to the War Department for physical examination and enrollment. This work has been accomplished by some 54 field activities of the Veterans' Administration.

Certain eligibility requirements must be met before a veteran may be enrolled in the Civilian Conservation Corps. He must be a citizen of the United States; must have had service in the armed forces of the United States during a period of war; must have been honorably discharged from such service; must be unemployed and in need of employment, and must be physically able to perform ordinary manual labor. It is also required that a veteran establish a permanent address within the State from which he is selected for enrollment. Transient veterans must return to their permanent addresses in order to obtain enrollment.

At the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1937, there were 21,961 veterans in enrollment status. The total authorized veterans' quota as of July 1, 1937, was 25,000. During July and October 1937 and January and April 1938 authorizations were issued for the filling of vacancies within the authorized quota which had resulted because of discharges to accept employment and for other reasons.

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1938, there were 17,707 veterans enrolled in the corps to fill vacancies. At the close of the fiscal year there were 22,544 veterans in enrollment status.

Effective as of July 1, 1938, the Civilian Conservation Corps veterans' quota was increased from 25,000 to 27,200 by authority of the Director of the corps, and authorization was issued to enroll 5,300 veterans during the month of July 1938 in order to bring the contingent to full strength.

The total number of veterans who have taken advantage of Civilian Conservation Corps work since the original enrollment in June 1933 is approximately 150,000, and the total number of other persons who have benefited by the participation of this number of veterans in the corps is more than 300,000.

The continuation of the Civilian Conservation Corps affords the veteran who is unable to obtain employment in private industry an opportunity to provide for the needs of his family and to render a useful service to the community as well as to the Government.

The Veterans' Administration does not maintain an employment service, but it has continued to cooperate with the United States Employment Service of the Labor Department, other Government

agencies, and recognized veterans' organizations in an effort to relieve unemployment among veterans. This cooperation has been extended through the field offices of the Veterans' Administration.

The Administrator of Veterans' Affairs is an active member of the Federal Advisory Council to the Director of the United States Employment Service and is chairman of the Committee on Veterans' Placement Service of that Council.

Reports of the United States Employment Service of the Labor Department as of June 30, 1938, indicate that there were 443,196 unemployed veterans registered for employment. This figure indicates that there continues to exist a need for concentrated effort on the part of the several agencies concerned.

MEDICAL TREATMENT AND DOMICILIARY CARE

HOSPITALIZATION

Remaining under treatment.—At the expiration of this fiscal year the total hospital load of the Veterans' Administration was 50,899 as compared with 46,416 on June 30, 1937, an increase of 4,483, or approximately 9.66 percent during this period. This increase was distributed by types as follows: Tuberculosis, 72; neuropsychiatric, 2,864; and general medical and surgical, 1,547. At the close of this year 76.32 percent of the veterans under hospitalization were receiving treatment for disabilities not of service origin, as compared with 74.37 percent on June 30, 1937.^b

The total patient load at the expiration of this year was composed of 50,670 United States veterans, classified by service as follows: World War, 45,496; Spanish-American War, 2,638; Civil War, 62; all other wars, expeditions, and occupations, 90; and Regular Establishment 2,384. There were 11,998 United States veterans under treatment for diseases or injuries determined to be of service origin, of whom 10,385 had service in the World War; 29 in the Spanish-American War; and 1,584 in the Regular Establishment during peacetime.

In addition to United States veterans there were under treatment 37 veterans of countries allied with the United States in the World War; 120 employees of the Civilian Conservation Corps and Works Progress Administration; and 72 miscellaneous beneficiaries. Included in the 50,670 United States veterans are 333 female and 4,948 colored beneficiaries.

Of the patients in hospitals at the close of this year 9.64 percent were under treatment for tuberculosis, 57.54 percent for neuropsychiatric diseases, and 32.82 percent for general medical and surgical conditions. This represents a marked change in the character of the patient load since June 30, 1923, when 41 percent of the patients were classed as tubercular, 39 percent as neuropsychiatric, and 20 percent as general.

Of the 50,670 United States veterans under treatment at the end of this year 47,285 were in facilities controlled by the Veterans' Administration, 2,512 in other Government hospitals, and 873 in State or civil institutions. Over 63 percent of the United States veterans in all hospitals are receiving treatment in facilities located in the State of their reported home addresses.

Admissions.—Since March 3, 1919, when the acquisition of Government hospital facilities was first authorized for the treatment of veterans of the World War, there have been 1,863,289 admissions of United States veterans to hospitals, of which 152,966 were made during this year, an increase of more than 8 percent over 1937. The admissions for 1938 were the highest of any fiscal year to date (and exceeded by 4,304 the previous peak year of 1932).

Since June 7, 1924, when hospitalization was first authorized for the veterans of all wars without regard to the origin of their disabilities, 1,053,761, or about 73 percent of all admissions, have been for the treatment of disabilities not connected with service. Over 91 percent of the admissions this year were on account of non-service-connected disabilities.

Of the United States veterans admitted to hospitals during this year 89.2 percent had service in the World War and 7.6 percent in the Spanish-American War. In addition to United States veterans there were 1,395 admissions of other patients, including 119 allied veterans, 947 employees of the Civilian Conservation Corps and Works Progress Administration, and 329 miscellaneous beneficiaries.

An analysis of the types of hospital admissions during this year shows that 63,965 or 41.8 percent of the total, were first admissions; 83,951, or 54.9 percent, readmissions; and 5,050, or 3.3 percent, admissions by transfer from other facilities.

During this year 10,989 admissions were authorized for the observation or treatment of pulmonary tuberculosis; 10,750 for psychotic or mental diseases; 12,686 for other neurological disorders, and 118,541 for general medical and surgical conditions.

There were 956 female and 14,154 colored veterans admitted to hospitals during this year.

Of the 152,966 admissions of United States veterans during this year, 130,939, or 85.6 percent, were made to facilities controlled by the Veterans' Administration; 19,954, or 13 percent, to other Government hospitals; and 2,073, or 1.4 percent, to civil or State hospitals.

Turn-over.—During the fiscal year 1938 the patient turn-over in all types of Veterans' Administration hospitals was approximately once every 4 months. Based upon the experience of this year, hospitals devoted principally to the treatment of neuropsychiatric diseases have a complete patient turn-over once every 2 years. The relatively low turn-over rate experienced for this type of case is due to the long and continuous hospital treatment usually required and a low mortality rate. During this fiscal year the turn-over rate for hospitals utilized primarily for the treatment of tuberculosis was about once every 4½ months. The turn-over rate for this year in hospitals treating a majority of general medical and surgical patients was approximately once every 1½ months.

Discharges.—During this fiscal year 202,081 patients were under hospitalization, of whom 200,626 were United States veterans. The total number of patients treated represents an increase of approximately 5 percent over 1937. Of the United States veterans treated 149,956 were discharged after an average of 76.9 in-patient days. Patients who remained until the completion of treatment numbered 119,107, or 79.43 percent of the total discharges. The incomplete cases totaled 30,849 and include 7,267 cases in which further treatment or care was required in another facility or out-patient clinic,

7,782 cases in which the patient was transferred to domiciliary care in the same facility, 15,497 cases in which the patient was discharged for personal reasons, i. e., against medical advice, leaving without permission, etc.; and 383 cases not entitled to hospitalization under the laws now in effect. Approximately 78 percent of the United States veterans discharged during this year had been under treatment for general diseases or conditions; 15 percent for neuropsychiatric diseases; and 7 percent for pulmonary tuberculosis. In 74 percent of the completed and 59 percent of the incomplete cases recovery or some improvement was effected.

Deaths in hospitals during this year totaled 10,117, or 6.75 percent of the discharges, as compared with 10,051, or 7.04 percent in 1937. Of the total deaths, 6,620 or 65.44 percent occurred among patients under treatment for general conditions; 1,979, or 19.56 percent, for pulmonary tuberculosis; and 1,518, or 15 percent, for neuropsychiatric diseases. Considering the total discharged after treatment for each type of disability during this year, 18.54 percent of the pulmonary tuberculosis cases resulted in death, 5.67 of the general, and 6.72 percent of the neuropsychiatric. Of the 6,620 deaths among general patients, approximately 36 percent were caused by diseases of the circulatory system, including organic heart disease, and approximately 33 percent by malignant tumors and diseases of the digestive system.

During the year 116,401 World War veterans were discharged after treatment for diseases or conditions not connected with service and 10,467 for disabilities of service origin. There were 6,375 cases in which the veteran was admitted for examination or observation, and 66 cases classed as emergency. The remaining 16,647 discharges of United States veterans were classified by service as follows: Spanish-American War, 87 service-connected and 11,618 non-service-connected; Regular Establishment, 2,327 service-connected and 2,175 non-service-connected; Civil War, ~~2 service-connected~~ and 199 non-service-connected; and miscellaneous occupations, rebellions, etc., 2 service-connected and 237 non-service-connected. In addition to United States veterans there were 1,226 discharges of other patients, 94 of which were for veterans of countries allied with the United States in the World War, 853 for employees of the Civilian Conservation Corps and Works Progress Administration, and 279 for miscellaneous beneficiaries.

Included in the total of 149,956 discharges of United States veterans during this year are 7,782 cases classified as intrafacility transfers, i. e., cases in which the veteran was transferred from hospital treatment to domiciliary care within the same facility.

DOMICILIARY CARE

Remaining.—On June 30, 1938, the veteran population reported as present in domiciliary status in facilities under the control and jurisdiction of the Veterans' Administration totaled 14,254, as compared with 11,038 on June 30, 1937, an increase of 3,216 during this fiscal period.

The number present in domiciliary status on June 30, 1938, was divided as to color and sex as follows: White males, 12,665; white females, 54; and colored males, 1,535.

The percentage distribution of the membership, by wars, as of June 30, 1938, was as follows: Civil, 0.03; Spanish-American, 6.11;

World, 89.46; other wars, expeditions, and occupations, 0.18; and peacetime service in the Regular Establishment, 4.22-3.79

The approximate average age of the veterans of each of the major wars who were present in domiciliary status at the close of this fiscal year was as follows: Civil, 93; Spanish-American, 63; and World, 45.

Of the veterans remaining under domiciliary care at the end of this year, 10,104 were disabled by general medical and surgical conditions, 3,844 by neuropsychiatric diseases, and 306 by tuberculosis.

Over three-fourths of the domiciled veterans on June 30, 1938, were under care in facilities located in California, Wisconsin, Ohio, Tennessee, Virginia, and Kansas.

In conformity with the act of August 27, 1888 (U. S. C., title 24, sec. 134), the Federal Government is required to reimburse State or Territorial homes for disabled volunteer soldiers at the rate of \$120 per year for each person domiciled therein who is eligible for similar care in facilities controlled by the Veterans' Administration. During this year an average of 5,622 such persons were cared for in these homes, thereby creating an obligation of approximately \$674,640 on the part of the Federal Government.

Admissions.—During this year there were 28,585 admissions for domiciliary care, as compared with 24,820 admissions for the fiscal year 1937, an increase of 3,765, or 15 percent.

An analysis of the types of admissions shows that 4,808 or 16.82 percent, were first admissions; 20,425, or 71.45 percent, readmissions; and 3,352, or 11.73 percent, admissions by transfer from other facilities.

Of the veterans admitted to domiciliary care during this year 25,269 or approximately 88 percent, had service in the World War, and 1,989, or approximately 7 percent, in the Spanish-American War.

There were 83 female and 2,363 colored veterans admitted for domiciliary care during the year.

Approximately 90 percent of the admissions this year were for non-service-connected disabilities.

Of the veterans admitted during this year 72 percent were disabled by general medical and surgical conditions, 26 percent by neuropsychiatric diseases, and 2 percent by tuberculosis.

Discharges.—During this year 26,276 veterans were discharged after an average period of 4 months' domiciliary care. These discharges were classified as follows: 11,292 routine; 8,011 transfers within the same or to other facilities; 49 deaths; 492 ineligible for further care; and 6,432 without formal discharge, including disciplinary reasons. Approximately 70 percent of the discharges were for veterans with general medical conditions. The principal causes of death among domiciled veterans were diseases of the arteries, organic diseases of the heart, and embolism and thrombosis, which collectively were responsible for approximately 53 percent of the deaths.

Of the total veterans discharged 23,083 were World War veterans, and of these 20,647 were disabled for non-service-connected disabilities. The other discharges were classified as to service as follows: Spanish-American War, 2,001; Regular Establishment, 1,113; Civil War, 26; and all other wars, occupations, and expeditions, 53. Included in the total of 26,276 discharges during this year are 6,273 cases classified as intrafacility transfers, i. e., cases in which the veteran was transferred from domiciliary care to hospital treatment within the same facility.

HOSPITAL AND DOMICILIARY FACILITIES

On June 30, 1938, the Veterans' Administration was operating hospital facilities at 81 locations in 43 States and the District of Columbia. These facilities had a capacity of 51,991 beds, an increase of 4,570 in the number reported on June 30, 1937. Approximately 80 percent of this increase was in beds for mental patients.

Additional hospital beds were acquired during this year through new construction, alterations, or readjustment of space at Alexandria, La., Atlanta, Ga., Bath, N. Y., Bedford, Mass., Camp Custer, Mich., Canandaigua, N. Y., Coatesville, Pa., Columbia, S. C., Fort Lyon, Colo., Gulfport, Miss., Jefferson Barracks, Mo., Lake City, Fla., Lexington, Ky., Los Angeles, Calif., Lyons, N. J., Mendota, Wis., Muskogee, Okla., Northampton, Mass., North Little Rock, Ark., Northport, Long Island, N. Y., Roseburg, Oreg., and St. Cloud, Minn.

At the expiration of this year the Veterans' Administration was utilizing 2,521 beds in other Government hospitals, distributed by branch of service as follows: Army, 1,017; Navy, 831; Public Health Service, 586; and Interior Department, 87.

On June 30, 1938, there were 16,798 beds set aside for domiciliary care in facilities under the jurisdiction of the Veterans' Administration as compared with 16,225 on June 30, 1937, an increase of 573. Additional domiciliary beds were acquired at Bath, N. Y., Bay Pines, Fla., Biloxi, Miss., Hot Springs, S. Dak., Kecoughtan, Va., and Togus, Maine. Losses were recorded at Dayton, Ohio, Los Angeles, Calif., Roseburg, Oreg., and Wood, Wis. The facility at Roseburg was converted to the neuropsychiatric type while the other reductions were due to the evacuation of space no longer considered satisfactory.

The total number of beds in facilities controlled by the Veterans' Administration on June 30, 1938, was 68,789 as compared with 63,646 on June 30, 1937, an increase of 5,143.

During the period beginning with the act of March 3, 1919, (Public, No. 326, 65th Cong.), and ending with the act of May 23, 1938, (Public, No. 534, 75th Cong.), the Congress has specifically authorized and appropriated the sum of \$153,722,000 for new hospital, domiciliary, and out-patient dispensary facilities. In addition, there has been expended since 1923 approximately \$24,650,000 from regular fiscal funds for permanent improvements and extensions to Veterans' Administration facilities. This latter figure, however, does not include expenditures for the purposes mentioned at the former national homes for disabled volunteer soldiers prior to their consolidation with the Pension and Veterans' Bureaus in July 1930. Further, the Veterans' Administration has been allotted for improvements and new construction at a number of its facilities, the sum of \$3,041,650 under the provisions of the National Recovery Act of 1933, and the sum of \$13,268,200 under the Public Works Administration Appropriation Act for 1938. In all, a total of \$194,681,850 has been made available for construction purposes during the last 20 years.

FUTURE HOSPITAL AND DOMICILIARY CONSTRUCTION

At the close of this fiscal year construction work was in progress on 22 major projects involving additional beds. These projects, together with the approximate dates for completion, are as follows:

The 3,626 additional beds to be acquired as the result of work in progress on June 30, 1938, were distributed by types as follows: Tuberculosis, 137; Neuropsychiatric, 1,711; general medical and surgical, 1,237; and domiciliary, 541.

In addition, work was completed in June on three projects providing a total of 269 additional beds. These beds, however, were not available to patients prior to the close of this fiscal year. The projects, together with the number and type of beds provided are as follows: Hot Springs, S. Dak., 95 general beds; Northampton, Mass., 48 neuropsychiatric beds; and Danville, Ill., 126 neuropsychiatric beds.

The above program provides for the acquisition of 3,811 neuropsychiatric and 2782 general beds. A total of 3,634, or 95 percent, of the neuropsychiatric and 2097, or 75 percent, of the general beds will be obtained from funds allotted to the Veterans' Administration under the Public Works Administration Appropriation Act for 1938.

As shown in another section of this report, there were available on June 30, 1938, in all facilities controlled by the Veterans' Administration, 51,991 hospital and 16,798 domiciliary beds, a total of 68,789 beds of both types. Upon completion of new construction for which funds are available, it is estimated there will be 62,262 hospital and 18,583 domiciliary beds, a combined total of 80,845 or 12,056 in excess of the number on June 30, 1938.

OPERATING AND PER DIEM COSTS FOR HOSPITAL AND DOMICILIARY FACILITIES

During this year the net operating expense for all hospital and domiciliary facilities controlled by the Veterans' Administration totaled \$49,076,115.42, of which \$44,203,638.42 was for hospital and \$4,872,477 for domiciliary facilities. This amount does not include expenditures for new construction, major alterations, nonexpendable equipment, or those for the diagnostic centers at San Francisco, Calif., and Hines, Ill. Throughout the year there was a daily average of 45,639 patients of all types under treatment, and a daily average of 13,514 beneficiaries receiving domiciliary care, as compared with 41,939 and 10,364 respectively, during the fiscal year 1937.

The per diem cost of operation for hospital facilities used principally for the treatment of tuberculosis was \$3.91 for this year, as compared with \$4.13 for last year. For hospital facilities devoted exclusively to the treatment of neuropsychiatric diseases the per diem rate for this year was \$1.88, as compared with \$1.96 for 1937. The per diem rate for hospital facilities used largely for the treatment of general

medical and surgical conditions was \$3.47 for this year, as compared with \$3.66 for last year. For all hospital facilities, the per diem rate for this year was \$2.65, as compared with \$2.81 in 1937, a reduction of 16 cents. The per diem cost of operation for domiciliary facilities this year was \$0.99, a reduction of 14 cents over last year.

PHYSICAL EXAMINATIONS AND OUT-PATIENT TREATMENT

During this year field facilities of this Administration made a total of 1,128,587 physical examinations for out-patient purposes, an increase of 49,199 in the number accomplished during the preceding fiscal year. Of the examinations made during this year 1,110,812 or 98 percent were medical and 17,775 or 2 percent, dental. Approximately 99 percent of the medical and 90 percent of the dental examinations were made by physicians on a salary basis as compared with 99 percent and 89 percent, respectively, during the fiscal year 1937. The comparatively few physical examinations made by designated physicians on a fee basis comprise for the most part simple general examinations not requiring the services of a specialist or laboratory examination, or cases in which the claimant or beneficiary is not physically or mentally able to travel to the nearest facility and it is more economical to employ a physician in the community than to travel a physician from the facility to and from the veterans' homes.

Treatments furnished during this year totaled 994,968 as compared with 895,208 last year, an increase of 99,760. Of the treatments furnished during this year 899,400 or approximately 90 percent were medical and 95,568 or 10 percent were dental. Approximately 87 percent of the medical and 93 percent of the dental treatments were furnished by physicians on a salary basis as compared with 84 and 92 percent, respectively, during the fiscal year 1937.

During this fiscal year there was authorized for expenditure the sum of approximately \$400,000 for the purchase of orthopedic and prosthetic appliances and repairs thereto. The largest single item of expenditure was \$122,000 for the purchase of artificial legs.

DENTAL ACTIVITIES

During this fiscal year the value of services furnished beneficiaries in dental clinics of the Veterans' Administration if computed on a civilian fee basis would have amounted to \$1,736,920, as compared with \$1,639,505 for the fiscal year 1937, an increase of \$97,415. The actual cost of furnishing this relief was \$904,381, thereby resulting in a net saving of \$832,539, or approximately 48 percent through the operation of these clinics. Of the total value of the services furnished in clinics the sum of \$385,170 was in connection with the treatment of service-connected disabilities and \$1,353,750, or approximately 78 percent of the total, as auxiliary to the treatment of non-service-connected disabilities for which beneficiaries were receiving hospitalization or domiciliary care.

The number of beneficiaries that received dental service in clinics during this fiscal year totaled 66,897, as compared with 59,795 in 1937, an increase of 7,102. In addition, dental services were furnished to 294 members of the Civilian Conservation Corps. Of the beneficiaries furnished dental relief during this year, 63,553 were receiving hos-

pitalization or domiciliary care at the time the service was rendered. The cost per case of furnishing this relief during 1938 was \$13.52, as compared with \$14.83 in 1937, \$14.68 in 1936, and \$25.93 in 1930. The reduction in the cost per case for this year was due largely to the handling of an increase of approximately 12 percent in the number of beneficiaries without any increase in dental officers.

Authorization for dental treatment by private practitioners serving as designated dentists, in those service-connected cases in which it was more economical to furnish relief in this manner, increased from 1,963 cases to the value of \$79,463 in the fiscal year 1937 to 2,000 cases to the value of \$82,133 in 1938.

During this year there were two major changes in policy covering the authorization of dental treatment. The authorization of outpatient dental treatment as a necessary adjunct to the treatment of service-connected general physical disabilities was decentralized to field facilities. Rehospitalization of veterans was authorized to permit of the construction of artificial dentures to replace natural organs extracted as a necessary auxiliary to the treatment of non-service-connected general physical disabilities during previous hospital episodes, and where artificial replacement was not made at that time. During the eight months that this policy has been in effect 864 beneficiaries availed themselves of this benefit, requiring the construction of 1,506 artificial dentures.

The demand for artificial dentures is increasing with the advance in age of beneficiaries. During 1938 these clinics constructed 26,063 artificial dentures and made repairs to 7,115 others, as compared with 22,742 new and 5,689 repaired dentures in 1937.

On June 30, 1938, there were 161 full-time dental officers on duty, as compared with 163 on the corresponding date of last year.

PENSIONS AND COMPENSATION

VETERANS

Civil War.—Out of a total of 2,213,365 that served in the Union forces in this war, which terminated 73 years ago, pensions were being paid to 5,048 veterans on June 30, 1938. This represents a reduction of 1,983 in the number of veterans since June 30, 1937. Of those on the pension roll at the close of this year, 933 were in receipt of \$75 per month, one \$85 per month, as authorized by the act of June 9, 1930, while 4,039 were being paid \$100 per month and 4, \$125 per month by reason of being helpless or blind or so nearly helpless or blind as to require the regular aid and attendance of another person. The balance of the pension roll consisted of 29 veterans who were in receipt of pension under the general laws for service-connected disabilities and 42 veterans who were beneficiaries of special acts of Congress. The disbursements for pensions to veterans during this fiscal period totaled \$6,448,253.46, as compared with \$8,967,519.20 for the previous year, a reduction of \$2,519,265.74. There were 9 claims filed during this year. The average age of veterans receiving pensions at the close of this year was 93.

During this year there were no changes in laws or regulations and procedure applicable to the claims of veterans of this war. However, a form letter was addressed to each veteran receiving a basic pension

of less than \$100 monthly, informing him of the provisions of section 2 of the act of June 9, 1930, and the conditions precedent to entitlement of \$100 per month.

Indian wars.—On June 30, 1938, pensions were being paid to 2,814 veterans on account of Indian war service, and the disbursements for this purpose amounted to \$1,889,161.99 during this fiscal year. This represents a decrease of 305 in the number of veterans on the roll June 30, 1937, and an increase of \$77,625.32 in disbursements over last year. There were 107 new claims filed during this year. The average age of veterans receiving pensions at the close of this year was 78.

Public, No. 355, Seventy-fifth Congress, enacted August 25, 1937, provides an increase of \$5 monthly in the rates of pension payable to veterans of these wars for one-half, three-fourths, and total disability, and increases by the same amount the rates of pension payable to those veterans for the attained ages of 62, 68, 72, and 75 years. In addition, the act provides a new rate of pension of \$72 monthly for disability requiring the regular aid and attendance of another person. The rate for regular aid and attendance is payable from the date of receipt in the Veterans' Administration of the evidence showing the requisite condition or the date of filing application therefor on or after September 1, 1937, whichever is the later. Under these provisions, pension may not exceed \$50 monthly while a veteran is maintained in the United States Soldiers' Home, a Veterans Administration facility, or a State soldiers' home and the rate for regular aid and attendance may not be allowed while the veteran is receiving such services in kind. The review of the 2,995 claims affected by the provisions of this act was completed prior to the end of the calendar year. Increased pensions were awarded in 2,729 claims, denied in 91 claims, and it was impossible to make current adjustments in 175 claims because the veterans were being maintained in a hospital or institution.

Spanish-American War, Boxer Rebellion, and Philippine Insurrection.—The number of veterans on the roll at the close of this fiscal year was 170,755 as compared with 175,361 on June 30, 1937, a decrease of 4,606. The disbursements for this purpose during 1938 totaled \$98,850,424.84 as compared with \$96,618,456.10 in 1937, an increase of \$2,231,968.74.

Of the 170,755 veterans on the roll, 168,680 were receiving pension payments for disabilities of nonservice origin or for age, 1,907 for conditions determined to be the result of service, and 168 were special act cases.

On June 30, 1938, the average monthly value of all pension awards for non-service-connected disabilities or age was \$48.49, for service-connected disabilities \$70.04, and for special act cases, \$23.85.

In addition to 170,755 veterans of this war on the roll at the close of this year there were on the same date 29 veterans who were formerly classed as Spanish-American War veterans but who are now receiving payments at peacetime rates. The average monthly value received by this group on June 30, 1938, was \$35.52. An analysis of the service-connected group by type of major disability indicates that 5 percent are suffering from tuberculosis; 10 percent from neuropsychiatric conditions; and 85 percent are classed as general medical and surgical cases. The average monthly value for these groups is as follows: Tuberculosis, \$75.88; neuropsychiatric, \$79.30; and general

medical, \$68.63. In the non-service-connected group 159,224 cases, or 94 percent of the total, are receiving pensions because of disabilities. The average monthly pension in these cases is \$48.61. In addition, 9,456 veterans, or 6 percent of the total, are receiving pensions by reason of age, the average monthly payments being \$46.53. A study of the age of all Spanish-American War veterans shows that 70 percent are between 55 and 65 years of age.

Public, No. 541, Seventy-fifth Congress, enacted May 24, 1938, provides a pension of \$60 monthly for soldiers, sailors, or marines who served honorably for 90 days between April 21, 1898, and July 4, 1902, both dates inclusive, and to nurses who served honorably for 90 days between April 21, 1898, and February 2, 1901, unless prior to the completion of 90 days' service within the respective periods the designated persons were discharged for disability incurred in the service in line of duty. This act also provides pension of \$100 monthly for any soldier, sailor, marine, or nurse, with service as defined above, who is now or hereafter may become, on account of age or physical or mental disabilities, helpless or blind, or so nearly helpless or blind as to need or require the regular aid and attendance of another person. Section 3 of Public, No. 541, Seventy-fifth Congress, provides: "That the pension or increased rate of pension herein provided for shall commence from the date of filing application therefor after the approval of this act in such form as may be prescribed by the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs * * *." Adjudication form 526, revised March 1938, has been prescribed by the Administrator as the form on which claims will be filed under this act. However, where there is already on file a formal application for service pension and benefits are being paid, any writing signed by the veteran or in his behalf, claiming increased pension, constitutes a valid application under the act. Under the first proviso of section 4 of the act no one while an inmate of the United States Soldiers' Home, the United States Naval Home, or any State soldiers' home and while the Government of the United States contributes toward defraying the expense incurred in providing such inmate with domiciliary care shall be paid more than \$50 per month. A veteran who has no dependents and is being maintained in a Veterans' Administration facility, is entitled to pension of only \$6 or \$15 monthly, depending upon whether his disability is service-connected or non-service-connected.

In view of the provisions of paragraph 3 of Public, No. 541, Seventy-fifth Congress, claims may not be automatically reviewed but may be considered only upon the filing of a claim for the increased rate. As of June 30, 1938, there had been filed by Spanish-American War veterans, including veterans of the Philippine Insurrection and Boxer Rebellion, 7,051 claims for the pension rate for attainment of age 65, and 1,416 claims for the rate for aid and attendance, totaling 8,467 claims under this enactment, representing more than 32 per centum of the total claims anticipated by Congress when the act was passed. Of the claims filed, slightly more than 46 per centum had been adjudicated on June 30, 1938, and of the unadjudicated claims 95 per centum were awaiting some action on the part of the veteran toward the perfection of his claim. Claims under Public, No. 541, Seventy-fifth Congress, are now being received at the rate of approximately 102 daily.

World War service-connected.—Compensation was being paid on June 30, 1938, to a total of 340,590 veterans suffering from disabilities directly or presumptively connected with service during the World War, an increase of 4,062 in the number on the roll at the beginning of this fiscal period. Of those on the roll at the close of this year 250,668 were receiving payments under Public, No. 141, and 89,922 under Public, No. 2, approved March 20, 1933. There were 226,855 of the group under Public, No. 141 receiving full payments, 21,196 receiving 75 percent of World War rates as presumptive cases, and 2,617 in which part of the payment was made at the full rate and part at 75 percent of the rate, depending on the service-connection of two or more disabilities. The disbursements during this fiscal year totaled \$166,875,-363.36 as compared with \$166,417,519.36 in 1937, an increase of \$457,844.00. An analysis of the major disabilities for which this compensation is being paid discloses that neuropsychiatric diseases are the disabling cause in 19.64 percent of the awards, tuberculosis in 16.56 percent, and general medical and surgical conditions in 63.80 percent. The average monthly payments by types, based upon the value of awards at the close of this year, were as follows: Neuropsychiatric, \$50.90; tuberculosis, \$53.67; and general medical and surgical, \$33.28. The average monthly payment for all types was \$40.12. Additional compensation was being paid on account of dependents in 42,715 cases in which the veteran was rated on a temporary basis at an average of \$7.63 per case per month. These dependents included 39,830 wives, 91,719 children, and 2,550 parents. On June 30, 1938, there were 2,740 disabled veterans to whom compensation was being paid who reside outside the continental limits of the United States.

As regards the claims of World War veterans, a renewed effort was made during the fiscal year to insure the proper and complete development of evidence in the prosecution of claims for compensation or pension. The attention of adjudicating agencies was called to the necessity of securing all available evidence by reason of the increasing complexity of the laws and regulations under which individual claims are determined.

The review pursuant to Section 5, Public, No. 304 resulted in increased payments to 2,388 veterans who reenlisted after November 11, 1918, and who had prior service during the World War. These veterans are now paid at war-time (World War) rates. A similar review of claims which had been disallowed or terminated as less than 10 percent March 19, 1933, practically completed within the year, resulted in 976 additions to the war-time service-connected rolls.

Public, No. 648, Seventy Fifth Congress, approved June 16, 1938, which is quoted in detail under "Regular Establishment" also affects World War veterans.

On March 25, 1937, a revision of the definition of misconduct was approved, so that for the purposes of sections 27 and 28, Public, No. 141, Seventy third Congress, despite the omission of the term "Willful" in the latter, the precedents under section 200 of the World War Veterans' Act, 1924, as amended, based upon willful misconduct would be applied. Under Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress, misconduct origin, though not willful, including gross negligence, remains a bar to the receipt of monetary benefits.

The adjudication of compensation or pension claims in all field offices was on a current basis at the close of the fiscal year. Adjudica-

tion agencies were enjoined to carry out the prime objectives of the Veterans' Administration under the law—among them, the effective protection of service connection under Public, No. 141, Seventy-third Congress, and the assignment of permanent ratings wherever possible under the liberal provisions of existing regulations. Out of a total of 249,909 World War active service connected cases under Public, No. 141, Seventy-third Congress, as of June 30, 1938, 198,381 cases were rated on a permanent basis. This constituted an increase of 15,509 over the showing of the preceding fiscal year.

Close attention was given to all the provisions of the 1933 rating schedule and related regulations, with regard to their adequacy in the evaluation of average impairments in earning capacity, and especially with regard to their adequacy in bringing about proper determinations of permanent total disability when the veteran has become permanently unemployable as a result of physical or mental disability. As one aspect of this study, authority had been given, April 6, 1937, to submit for central office review all claims in which the denial of a favorable rating, or a rating considered inadequate, was considered by the veteran to result from schedular inadequacy. Approximately 637 claims were so submitted, but neither the number, which was comparatively small, nor the evidence of direct relationship between disability and unemployment, lacking in the far majority of claims, warranted a determination that the schedule failed in liberality in such a manner as to affect any large number of claims. The policy was applied to taking into account the effect of such factors as unemployment, the man's environment, his age, and those qualities which determine greatly his ability to obtain employment and carry on. The review afforded an opportunity to evaluate the various items of the rating schedule in cooperation with medical officers detailed for the purpose from two of the diagnostic centers, and the conclusions resulting from this study are being prepared for early release.

World War non-service-connected.—This group of totally disabled World War veterans whose disabilities have been determined to be not due to their military service, is a steadily increasing group as is to be expected with the advancing age of veterans and the hazards of disease and injury in civilian life. During this fiscal year the number on the roll increased from 41,594 to 46,748, all at the present total disability rate of \$30 per month unless reduced to \$6 on account of receiving institutional care at Government expense and having no dependents. Of those on the roll, 465 or 0.99 percent, are over 68 years of age; 1,023, or 2.19 percent are over 62 years of age; and 2,524, or 5.40 percent, are over 55 years of age.

Regular Establishment.—During this fiscal year the number of veterans on the pension roll as a result of disability incurred in service in time of peace increased from 33,036 to 33,062. Disbursements decreased from \$8,947,027.17 in 1937 to \$8,868,785.83, and the average monthly value from \$22.17 in 1937 to \$22.07.

Under Public, No. 648, Seventy-fifth Congress, approved June 16, 1938, liberalization was effected, in determinations under Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress, so that compensation or pension is payable for disability resulting from venereal disease if in fact innocently acquired, and so that disabilities incurred on furlough or leave of absence, without regard to the interference caused by the absence,

upon performance of regular routine of duty, may be considered in line of duty.

Claims of veterans with service in the regular establishment were indirectly affected by Public, No. 732, Seventy-fifth Congress, "The Naval Reserve Act of 1938," which was enacted on June 25, 1938. Public, No. 159, Seventy-fifth Congress, which was enacted near the close of the fiscal year 1937 amended regulation 1 (a), part II of Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress, to grant pension to reserve officers or members of the enlisted reserves of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps, suffering disability while performing active service, including service for training purposes. This act grants a pensionable status to those reservists who were considered to be in the active service by the War Department, Navy Department, or Marine Corps at the time the diseases or injuries or aggravation of preexisting diseases or injuries were incurred. Public, No. 732, Seventy-fifth Congress, in section 304 thereof expressly provides that "For the purposes of this section and of said act all members of the Naval Reserve shall be considered as performing active military or naval service while performing active duty with or without pay, training duty with or without pay, drills, equivalent instruction or duty, appropriate duty, or other prescribed duty, or while performing authorized travel to or from such duties."

DEPENDENTS

War of 1812. Although 123 years have elapsed since the close of this war, there was at the end of this year one person still receiving pension on account of service rendered by a soldier in this war. This beneficiary is Esther Ann Hill Morgan, Independence, Oreg., daughter of John Hill, private, Clark's and McCumber's Companies, New York Militia, pensioned at the rate of \$20 per month.

Carolina King, of Cheektowaga, New York, whose husband was Darius King, a private of Steven's Company, New York Militia, and who was pensioned at the rate of \$50 per month, died June 28, 1938. She was the last surviving widow-pensioner of this war.

Mexican War.—This war ended May 30, 1848, over 90 years ago. On June 30, 1938, there were 195 widows of veterans of this war on the pension rolls, while payments to this class totaled \$116,687.99 in 1938. This represents a decrease of 26 in the number on the rolls June 30, 1937, and a reduction of \$16,088.35 in disbursements for 1937.

Civil War.—On June 30, 1938, pensions were being paid to the widows, children, brothers, and sisters of 66,873 deceased veterans of this war, as compared with 76,131 at the beginning of this fiscal period, a decrease of 9,258. These pensions were being paid to 64,507 widows, 1,151 children, and 1,434 other beneficiaries. There were 8,651 cases in which \$30 per month was being paid, 50,243 in which the beneficiary was in receipt of \$40 per month as provided by law for widows of the attained age of 70 years, and 1,122 in which \$50 per month was being paid as authorized by law for widows who were the wives of soldiers during their service in this war. There were 5,640 cases in which dependents were in receipt of pensions under special acts of Congress, and 1,217 in which the dependents were being paid pensions under the general laws because of the death of the veteran from causes due to military service. The disbursements during this fiscal period totaled

\$32,784,881.19 as compared with \$37,628,438.76 for last year, a decrease of \$4,843,557.57. The peak in the number on the roll was reached in 1912, when the dependents of 304,373 deceased veterans were receiving pensions.

During this year 1,027 widow and 139 other dependent claims were under consideration, of which 811 were disposed of, leaving 312 widow and 43 other claims pending on June 30, 1938. The number of widows and other dependents dropped from the pension rolls during this year by reason of death was 9,831 or 12.91 percent, of the number on the rolls at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Indian wars.—On account of Indian war service the dependents of 4,426 deceased veterans were in receipt of pensions on June 30, 1938, and to this class \$1,628,059.30 was paid during 1938. These figures represent decreases of 164 in the number of cases on June 30, 1937, and \$53,847.36 in disbursements over last year. The dependents receiving pensions on June 30, 1938, totaled 4,463, and were classified as follows: widows, 4,383; children, 73; and others 7. During this year 286 claims were considered, of which 277 were disposed of.

Spanish-American War.—On June 30, 1938, pensions were being paid to the widows, children, and dependent parents of 53,345 veterans of this war as compared with 50,292 on June 30, 1937, an increase of 3,053. These pensions were being paid to 50,570 widows, 9,586 children, and 521 parents, a total of 60,677. To these beneficiaries \$19,332,593.49 was paid during this year, as compared with \$18,305,668.73 in the previous year, an increase of \$1,026,924.76.

The claims of widows, remarried widows, minor children, and dependents of veterans under consideration during this year numbered 6,657 of which 5,243 were disposed of, leaving 1,414 pending at the close of this year, awaiting receipt of necessary proofs to establish title to pension.

World War—Service-connected death.—On June 30, 1938, compensation was being paid to the widows, children, and dependent parents of 95,118 veterans of the World War who died in service or as a result of diseases or injuries incurred either directly or presumptively in service during said war, as compared with 99,032 at the close of the fiscal year 1937, a decrease of 3,914 cases. This compensation was being paid to 28,135 widows, 37,378 children, and 76,779 parents. Death claims have been paid to date to the widows and dependents of 145,927 deceased veterans.

The disbursements for this purpose during the fiscal year of 1938 totaled \$42,359,416.32, as compared with \$34,301,524.70 in 1937, an increase of \$8,057,891.62. This increase was due to the enactment of Section 3 of Public, No. 304, Seventy-fifth Congress, August 16, 1937, which increased the rates payable to certain widows and dependent parents not barred from receiving it by receipt of installments of Government insurance, and to the liberalization of the definition of the term "widow" by Section 4 of Public, No. 304, Seventy-fifth Congress; and also by a further liberalization contained in Section 3 of Public, No. 514, Seventy-fifth Congress, enacted May 13, 1938, which provides that the widow of a World War veteran shall mean a woman who was married prior to the date of enactment of the act.

An analysis of the principal causes of death of veterans who died as a result of service, and whose dependents are now receiving benefits, discloses that 31 percent died from tuberculosis, 26 percent from

injuries, principally wounds in action, and 23 percent from diseases of the respiratory system, other than tuberculosis.

A study of the awards for this benefit indicates that 35 percent of the deaths on account of which payments were being made on June 30, 1938, occurred prior to July 2, 1921, the official ending date of the World War.

At the close of this year service-connected death compensation payments were being made in 5,845 cases where the dependents reside in United States possessions and foreign countries, the annual value of these awards being \$2,732,100.

Death not due to service.—The act of June 28, 1934, Public, No. 484, Seventy-third Congress, authorized the payment of compensation to the widows and children of World War veterans who died from causes not connected with service while in receipt of compensation for disability rated at 30 percent or more.

To date 31,677 claims have been adjudicated, of which 7,773 have been allowed. On June 30, 1938, payments were being made on 7,422 cases involving 6,024 widows and 12,419 children. The average monthly value per case is \$29.62, and during this year \$2,623,668.90 was disbursed for this benefit, an increase of \$771,686.03 over 1937. The original act provided that benefits could not be paid unless the compensation payable to the veteran at the time of his death was for disability directly connected with service, thereby excluding cases where the 30 percent rating was based, in whole or in part, upon disabilities presumptively connected with service. Another provision denied benefits wherever death was due to misconduct even though compensation had been paid the veteran for directly service-connected disabilities, including wounds received in action. Public, No. 844, approved June 29, 1936, amended Public, No. 484 by including the presumptive cases and by eliminating the misconduct clause.

On August 16, 1937, Public, No. 304, Seventy-fifth Congress, became a law. Section 1 of this act reduced the percentage of disability from which a veteran must have been suffering at death requisite to create entitlement in the widow to 20 per centum, provided a child was born of the marriage. The 20 per centum disability at death was also basis of title in the minor child or children, in case of the widow's death or remarriage. Section 1 of Public, No. 304, Seventy-fifth Congress, was repealed by section 4 of the act of May 13, 1938 (Public, No. 514, 75th Cong.) and in its place there was enacted section 1 of the latter act which grants the rates authorized in Section 1 of Public, No. 484, Seventy-third Congress, if the veteran was suffering at death from a 10 percent disability, either presumptively or directly incurred in or aggravated by service. Under this section the widow must have married the veteran prior to May 13, 1938.

Regular Establishment.—On June 30, 1938, pensions were being paid to the dependents of 8,725 veterans whose death was determined to be the result of disease or injury originating in line of duty in the military or naval service in time of peace. This is an increase of 616 cases during the fiscal year 1938. These pensioners received during this period \$2,645,831.53, an increase of \$178,754.78 over last year. The dependents of these deceased veterans totaled 13,822 and were divided as follows: Widows, 4,767; children, 5,036; and parents, 4,019. Claims considered during this year totaled 1,835, of which number final action was taken in 1,327 cases.

On June 28, 1938, Public, No. 758, Seventy-fifth Congress, was enacted, granting the rates authorized in Veterans Regulation No. 1 (g), Paragraph 2, to persons entitled to pension under the general pension law (sections 4702 and 4707 R. S. as amended) for death resulting from service rendered prior to April 21, 1898. Only 565 claims are involved.

SUMMARY

The following table shows by wars and for the Regular Establishment the number of living veterans receiving monetary benefits, exclusive of insurance and adjusted compensation, on June 30, 1938, and June 30, 1937, and the total payments to them during the fiscal years 1938 and 1937, together with number of deceased veterans on whose account dependents were receiving compensation or pension benefits on June 30, 1938, and June 30, 1937, and the disbursements to dependents for these purposes during the fiscal years 1938 and 1937.

RETIREMENT OF EMERGENCY OFFICERS OF THE WORLD WAR

On June 30, 1938, there were 1,854 emergency officers of the World War entitled to retirement pay, as compared with 1,869 on June 30, 1937; a decrease of 15 during this fiscal period. Of the 1,854 officers on the active roll at the close of this year, 1,818 were receiving full payment. In the remaining 36 cases, there was a complete forfeiture of retirement in 23 and a partial in 13. Eighteen of the complete forfeitures were due to the application of section 212 of Public, No. 212, Seventy-second Congress, approved June 30, 1932, which provided that in case the salary of any retired officer (except those whose disability was incurred in combat with an enemy of the United States) in the employ of the Federal Government together with the retirement pay exceeds \$3,000 per annum, the retirement pay should be reduced or discontinued to the extent to which the sum of the two equal \$3,000. Of the remaining five complete forfeitures three were on account of active duty in the National Guard and two because the beneficiary was incompetent and had an estate of over \$1,500. Of the 13 partial forfeitures 7 were due to the application of section 212

of Public, No. 212, hereinbefore mentioned and 6 because the beneficiaries were receiving retirement pay as enlisted men of the Regular Army.

The average monthly payment for officers receiving full retirement pay was \$136.96, based on the annual value of the roll at the close of this year, as compared with \$136.99 on June 30, 1937; a decrease of 3 cents.

The disbursements for this purpose during the fiscal year 1938 totaled \$3,117,230 as compared with \$3,138,956 in 1937; a decrease of \$21,726. Of the 1,854 officers entitled to retirement at the close of this year, 1,818 served in the Army, 24 in the Navy, and 12 in the Marine Corps.

INSURANCE

At the close of the fiscal year, there were 602,614 Government life (converted) insurance policies in force, aggregating \$2,569,240,190 of insurance as compared with 596,832 policies in force, aggregating 2,577,982,119 of insurance at the close of the preceding fiscal year.

The net increase of 5,782 policies during the fiscal year 1938 is in excess of the increases during the fiscal years 1937 and 1936. There was a decrease of \$8,741,929 in the amount of insurance in force during the fiscal year 1938 as compared with a decrease during the fiscal year 1937, amounting to \$12,500,160. The number of new policies issued during the fiscal year 1938 is 28,335 as compared with 22,983 issued during the previous fiscal year.

A new dividend schedule was adopted January 1, 1938, and there has been reserved for the payment of dividends the sum of \$8,173,000 to be distributed to policyholders entitled in accordance with this schedule on the anniversary dates of their policies during the calendar year of 1938.

There was in force at the end of the calendar year 1937 a total disability insurance amounting to \$102,811,517 issued in connection with 19,413 Government life-insurance policies in accordance with section 311 of the act as amended July 3, 1930, and total disability insurance amounting to \$2,487,000 issued in connection with 582 policies in accordance with the amendment of May 29, 1928.

Applications.—Applications for United States Government life (converted) insurance, approved during this fiscal year totalled 28,335, aggregating \$84,362,349, as compared with 22,983 applications amounting to \$65,891,266 approved during the fiscal year 1937. The total number of applications approved to June 30, 1938, is 1,005,004 amounting to \$4,307,701,272 insurance.

Policies issued.—The following table shows the number and amount of United States Government life (converted) insurance policies issued by months for the fiscal year 1938.

Policies surrendered for cash and paid-up insurance.—United States Government life-insurance policies provide that after having been in force 1 year they may be surrendered for cash or paid-up insurance. During this fiscal year, there were 9,129 policies, representing \$26,202,-985.31 insurance, surrendered for cash. The total number of policies surrendered for cash through June 30, 1938, is 122,873, representing \$388,180,418 insurance.

During this fiscal year policies having a total face amount of \$1,135,500 were surrendered for paid-up insurance, while 213 policies having a total face amount of \$472,722 paid-up insurance were issued. Through June 30, 1938, policies having a total face amount of \$24,405,-520 have been surrendered for paid-up insurance, and 4,497 policies having a total face amount of \$5,521,922.04 paid-up insurance have been issued.

Premium income.—United States Government life-insurance premiums are deposited to the credit of the United States Government life-insurance fund from which are paid claims on account of total permanent disability and death, dividends and refunds. During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1938, premiums amounting to \$62,821,033.94 were received on United States Government life insurance policies. The amount of United States Government life-insurance premiums received to date totals \$1,000,014,326.06.

United States Government life-insurance fund.—The United States Government life-insurance fund is a trust fund administered by the Government as trustee for the sole benefit of the policyholders. The Government derives no profit whatever from the administration of the fund which may be used only for the payment of claims under United States Government life-insurance contracts and dividends to the policyholders themselves. All premiums paid on United States Government life insurance and all interest earned thereon are covered into this fund in the United States Treasury. In considering the United States Government life-insurance fund it must be clearly understood that the beneficial interest in the reserves belongs exclusively to the policyholders.

Dividends.—Dividends on United States Government life insurance represent a return from the excess of the premiums paid over the actual current cost of the insurance protection, provided the reserves necessary to cover the future liability assumed on account of the combined benefits, including both total permanent disability and death, have been accumulated.

All policies of United States Government life insurance include a provision granting benefits on account of total permanent disability, which is exceptionally valuable due to the fact that there is no limit as to the age before which such disability must occur. The premiums charged for this combined benefit, including both death and total permanent disability are the *net* premiums for the death benefit only, based on the assumption that the deaths will occur in accordance with the American experience table of mortality and that the invested funds will earn $3\frac{1}{2}$ percent interest. There is no loading added to the net premium for expenses, since the Government pays all the cost of administration as well as the losses resulting from the extra hazard of the military or naval service.

The cost of providing the benefits on account of total permanent disability is not the same for all policyholders, but varies with the plan of insurance and the age of the insured. It is greater under the life plans than under the endowment plans for the reason that under the former the protection is continued for the whole period of life, while under the latter, it ceases at the end of the endowment period. Furthermore, the cost under any given plan increases with the age of the insured.

Since no additional premium is charged for the benefit granted on account of total permanent disability, it is necessary to make provision for the cost of this benefit out of earnings which otherwise would be considered as surplus, if no benefit on account of total permanent disability were provided, before any part of these earnings can be distributed as dividends.

The present schedule of dividend payments is the result of an extensive study made by competent and disinterested consulting actu-

aries of the experience over a period of years under United States Government life insurance and it equitably reflects the sources from which gains and savings are derived. Under this schedule, those policies on which the premiums and earnings to date have been adequate to build up the entire reserves required on account of both the death and total permanent disability benefits provided in the policy are entitled to and are receiving dividends. Those policies which have not yet accumulated the necessary reserves will not become entitled to dividends unless and until the reserves required have been accumulated.

There were 407,524 dividends amounting to \$7,409,905.18 paid during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1938. The total dividends paid to date are 7,757,754 amounting to \$84,022,647.06.

Converted claims.—Through June 30, 1938, a total of 37,303 awards had been made on account of death and 11,646 by reason of permanent and total disability. These death awards involved the payment of insurance in the amount of \$212,641,245, of which \$153,631,240 was disbursed in lump-sum payments to 28,255 beneficiaries. Death cases numbering 3,393 having insurance amounting to \$13,733,157 have been terminated due to expiration of installment payments. Payments of converted insurance averaging \$35.34 monthly are being made to 10,116 permanently and totally disabled veterans.

During the calendar year 1937 awards were made to the beneficiaries of 2,723 deceased veterans, and 1,184 awards were made to veterans with permanent and total disabilities as compared with 3,110 and 826, respectively, during the calendar year 1936.

An analysis of the principal plans of insurance on which death claims were paid during the calendar year 1937 shows that 27 percent of the policies were ordinary life, 23 percent were 20-payment life, 17 percent 20-year endowment, and 13 percent 5-year convertible term. Of the policies on which disability claims were paid during the same period, 21 percent were 5-year convertible term, 31 percent were ordinary life, 18 percent 20-payment life, and 14 percent were 20-year endowment.

Term and automatic claims.—The disbursements for term and automatic insurance during this year totaled \$82,521,520, and to date \$2,089,005,964, which is \$1,634,668,881 in excess of the \$454,337,083 received in premiums. On June 30, 1938, monthly installments of term insurance were being paid to 11,582 permanently and totally disabled veterans and to the beneficiaries of 106,392 deceased veterans, as compared with 12,040 disability and 119,966 death awards on June 30, 1937. The relatively large decrease in death awards during this year was due principally to the termination of 9,832 cases between October 1937 and June 30, 1938, by the payment of the last of 240 monthly installments. A much larger reduction can be expected in the next fiscal year because of the many veterans who died in 1918 and 1919. The other factor contributing to this decrease was the payment in lump sum of the commuted value of the unpaid installments upon the death of the beneficiary named in the policy, as authorized in section 303 of the World War Veterans' Act. These lump sum payments totaled \$8,172,526 during this year and \$185,069,425 to date. In addition, \$695,851 was paid during this year on 175 compromise cases authorized under Public, No. 78, Seventy-third Congress, June 16, 1933, of which 123 were disability and 52 death cases. To date \$4,140,588 has been paid on 1,023

 compromise/cases authorized under this act, of which 746 were disability and 277 death cases. Permanent total disability payments averaging \$47.96 per month are being made on insurance valued at \$96,602,881. The States having the largest number of veterans receiving these payments are as follows: New York, 999; California, 985; Pennsylvania 634; Illinois, 598; and Massachusetts, 484. An analysis of the disabilities for which term insurance is being paid discloses the fact that neuropsychiatric diseases are the disabling cause in 49.91 percent of the awards, tuberculosis in 24.10 percent, and general medical and surgical conditions in 25.99 percent. Awards of insurance to permanently and totally disabled veterans have been terminated in 26,760 cases. In 14.96 percent of these cases the reason for termination was recovery, and in 82.25 percent the death of the veteran. 14.94. 81.76. 12.85.

Considering the terminations among veterans permanently and totally disabled because of tuberculosis, 13.45 percent recovered, 85.25 percent died. In the neuropsychiatric group, 16.32 percent recovered and 76.21 percent died, while in the general medical and surgical group 18.39 percent recovered and 77.53 percent died. 11.37.

It is noted that of the 106,392 death claims on which installments (are now being paid, 90,938, or 85.47 percent of the veterans died prior to the official closing date of the World War, July 2, 1921. These payments) are being made to 57,357 parents, 19,111 widows, 2,128 children, and 27,796 other beneficiaries. The largest number of active death awards are in the following States: New York, 9,862; Pennsylvania, 7,706; and Illinois, 5,938. 11.5.

Payments of automatic insurance (provided for those who were permanently and totally disabled or who died within 120 days after entrance into service and before making application for term insurance) are being made to 289 permanently and totally disabled veterans, of whom 196, or 67.82 percent, are suffering from neuropsychiatric diseases; 52 or 17.99 percent from tuberculosis; and 41 or 14.19 percent from general medical and surgical conditions. In the cases of 1,544 deceased veterans, this insurance is being paid to their beneficiaries, classified as follows: 1,201 parents, 175 widows, and 168 children. During this fiscal year, 3,616 cases were terminated by the payment of the last of 240 monthly installments. 11. 12. 34.

LEGAL ACTIVITIES

LEGISLATION

The fiscal year embraced the close of the first session of the Seventy-fifth Congress (July 1, 1937–August 21, 1937), all of the second session (November 15, 1937–December 21, 1937), and all of the third session (January 3, 1938–June 16, 1938). During this period 1,765 bills were introduced pertaining to veterans' benefits, many of which had for their purpose material changes in existing laws affecting veterans' relief. Of these, 1,032 were public bills and 733 were for private relief. There were prepared 567 digests on bills introduced on and after July 1, 1937, and the current action of Congress reported thereon. Digests on 633 bills which had been introduced in the Seventy-fifth Congress prior to July 1, 1937, and which were still pending during the fiscal year were also maintained on a current basis in order to reflect congressional action thereon. There were 27 drafts of proposed bills prepared in accordance with the requests of committees and Members of Congress. Eighty-nine résumés and studies of various laws concerning rights of veterans and their dependents were prepared. One hundred ninety-nine reports were furnished committees of Congress on pending legislation and six were furnished to individual Members. Fifty-one reports were furnished the Bureau of the Budget and the President regarding proposed legislation.

New legislation.—Public, No. 288, Seventy-fifth Congress, first session, August 14, 1937, amends section 4 of the Adjusted Compensation Payment Act, 1936, as amended, to provide that the amount of any payment on account of an adjusted service certificate of a deceased veteran (including any payment heretofore made) which, under the law of the State or country pursuant to which the estate of the deceased veteran would be distributed, would otherwise escheat to such State or country, shall escheat to the United States and shall be covered into the general funds of the Treasury.

Public, No. 304, Seventy-fifth Congress, first session, August 16, 1937, an act to liberalize the provisions of existing laws governing service-connected benefits for World War veterans and their dependents, and for other purposes, provides as follows:

Section 1 provides that compensation to a widow, child, or children of a deceased World War veteran under Public, No. 484, Seventy-third Congress, as amended by Public, No. 844, Seventy-fourth Congress, shall not be denied if the veteran was suffering from a service-connected disability of 20 per centum degree or more at time

of death. The prior minimum degree of disability required was 30 per centum. The section does not apply to a widow unless a child was born of her marriage to the veteran.

NOTE.—This section was repealed by section 4, Public, No. 514, Seventy-fifth Congress, third session, May 13, 1938.

Section 2 amends section 4 of Public, No. 484, Seventy-third Congress, so as to permit a post mortem finding of service connection. A ruling of the Comptroller General (A-68297; Dec. 14, 1935) precluded such determinations under Public, No. 484.

Subject to certain limitations which will hereafter be noted, section 3 provides for increases in rates of service-connected death compensation as follows: For widows between 50 and 65 years of age, an increase from \$35 to \$37.50 a month; for widows over 65, an increase from \$40 to \$45 a month; for a dependent parent, an increase from \$20 to \$45 a month. In case of both a dependent mother and father, the rate for each is increased from \$15 to \$25 a month. If a deceased veteran's dependent is receiving compensation and insurance in an amount equal to or in excess of the amount of compensation authorized by the section, the increased rate is not applicable. As to widows and children the total compensation payable may not exceed \$75 a month.

Section 4 defines the term "widow of a World War veteran." While the delimiting marriage date of July 3, 1931, is retained, a new provision includes a widow of a World War veteran regardless of the date of marriage, provided a child was born of such marriage. The section also provides that compensation shall not be payable to a widow unless there was continuous cohabitation with the veteran from date of marriage to date of death, except where there was a separation without fault on the part of the widow.

NOTE.—This section was repealed by section 4, Public, No. 514, Seventy-fifth Congress, third session, May 13, 1938.

Section 5 provides that, except as to emergency officers' retirement pay, reenlistment after November 11, 1918, and before July 2, 1921, provided there was prior service between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918, shall be considered as World War service under the laws providing benefits for World War veterans and their dependents.

Section 6 provides that death compensation shall be effective as of the date of death of the World War veteran if claim is filed within 1 year after death. Previously such an award was effective from date of application.

Section 7 adds a new section, to be known as section 312, to the World War Veterans' Act, 1924, as amended, providing that as to automatic insurance, yearly renewable term insurance, and United States Government life (converted) insurance issued prior to December 15, 1936, the permanent loss of the use of both feet, of both hands, or of both eyes, or of one foot and one hand, or of one foot and one eye, or of one hand and one eye, or the loss of hearing of both ears or the organic loss of speech, shall be deemed total permanent disability for insurance purposes.

Section 8 grants authority to the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs to pay to the dependents of an incompetent veteran receiving compensation under title III of the act of March 28, 1934 (Public, No. 141, Seventy-third Cong.), who disappears, the amount of compensa-

tion payable to dependents of deceased veterans who die from war service connected disabilities, except that payment shall not exceed the amount of compensation payable at the time of the veteran's disappearance. A similar provision already exists with reference to benefits payable under Veterans regulations promulgated pursuant to Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress.

Section 9 makes the penal and forfeiture provisions relating to pensions and compensation contained in Public, No. 2, Seventy-third Congress, applicable to claims for compensation under Public, No. 484, Seventy-third Congress, as amended by Public, No. 844, Seventy-fourth Congress, and this act.

Public, No. 338, August 23, 1937, extends further time for naturalization to alien veterans of the World War under the act approved May 25, 1932 (47 Stat. 165), and also extends the same privileges to certain veterans of countries allied with the United States during the World War.

Public, No. 354, August 25, 1937, Third Deficiency Appropriation Act, fiscal year 1937, appropriates \$6,713.25 for payment of judgments and authorized claims affecting the Veterans' Administration.

Public, No. 355, August 25, 1937, granting pensions and increases of pensions to certain soldiers who served in the Indian wars from 1817 to 1898, and for other purposes, provides increased pensions for Indian war veterans so that a veteran aged 62 will receive \$25 per month in place of the prior rate of \$20; aged 68, \$35 in place of the prior rate of \$30; aged 72, \$45 in place of the prior rate of \$40; aged 75, \$55 in place of the prior rate of \$50. The measure provides an increase from \$20 to \$55 per month for disability in place of \$20 to \$50 authorized under prior law. There is also provided a pension of \$72 per month for Indian war veterans who are now or may hereafter become, on account of age or physical or mental disability, helpless or blind, or so nearly helpless or blind as to require the regular aid and attendance of another person. It also contains a limitation that an amount in excess of \$50 per month shall not be paid to any person under the provisions of the measure while an inmate of the United States Soldiers' Home or of any national or State soldiers' home.

Public, No. 357, August 25, 1937, to afford protection of pension benefits to peace-time veterans placed on the pension rolls after March 19, 1933, and for other purposes, cancels paragraph X of Veterans Regulation No. 10, as amended. That paragraph contained restrictive provisions as to the payment of pensions to a person holding an office or position, appointive or elective, under the United States Government, or the municipal government of the District of Columbia, or under any corporation, the majority of stock of which is owned by the United States. The paragraph had become almost inoperable as a result of legislation enacted by the Congress subsequent to March 20, 1933.

Public, No. 434, Seventy-fifth Congress, third session, February 24, 1938, provides "That the Attorney General of the United States is hereby authorized to agree to a judgment to be rendered by the presiding judge of the United States court having jurisdiction of the case, pursuant to compromise approved by the Attorney General upon the recommendation of the United States attorney charged with the defense, upon such terms and for sums within the amount claimed to be payable, in any suit brought under the provisions of the World War

Veterans' Act, 1924, as amended, on a contract of yearly, renewable term insurance which may be now pending or hereafter may be filed, and the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs is hereby authorized and directed to make payments in accordance with any such judgment: *Provided*, That the Comptroller General of the United States is hereby authorized and directed to allow credit in the accounts of disbursing officers of the Veterans' Administration for all payments of insurance made in accordance with any such judgment: *Provided further*, That all such judgments shall constitute final settlement of the claim and no appeal therefrom shall be authorized."

Public, No. 440, March 5, 1938, First Deficiency Appropriation Act, fiscal year 1938, appropriates \$26,243.25 for payment of judgments and authorized claims affecting the Veterans' Administration.

Public, No. 494, April 26, 1938, "An Act to authorize the transfer of certain military reservations to other agencies of the Government and to the people of Puerto Rico, and for other purposes," provides for the transfer from the War Department to the Veterans' Administration of 23 acres of the Fort Miley, Calif., Military Reservation.

Public, No. 510, May 13, 1938, establishes the 11th day of November in each year as a legal holiday to be known as Armistice Day, and to be dedicated to the cause of world peace.

Public, No. 514, May 13, 1938, has two general purposes, viz, to liberalize the provisions of Public, No. 484, Seventy-third Congress, June 28, 1934, as amended, and to prescribe a definition of the term "widow of a World War veteran."

Section 1 amends section 1 of Public, No. 484, Seventy-third Congress, as amended by section 1 of Public, No. 844, Seventy-fourth Congress, June 29, 1936, and section 1, Public, No. 304, Seventy-fifth Congress, August 16, 1937, so as to reduce the requisite degree of service connected disability from 20 per centum to 10 per centum and to remove the limitation which bars payment of compensation to a widow unless a child was born of her marriage to the veteran.

Section 2 amends section 4 of Public, No. 484, Seventy-third Congress, as amended by section 2 of Public, No. 304, Seventy-fifth Congress, which provides for establishment after the death of the veteran of service connection of disability and degree thereof at time of death by changing the degree of disability which must be shown to have existed at the veteran's death from 20 per centum to 10 per centum. It also removes the time limit for filing proof and evidence of degree of disability at time of death and service-connection thereof.

Section 3, which incorporates the second general purpose of the act, provides that for the purpose of payment of compensation under the laws administered by the Veterans' Administration the term "widow of a World War veteran" shall mean a woman who was married prior to the date of enactment of the act to the person who served. The delimiting date of marriage under the prior law was July 3, 1931, except that the definition included as a widow a woman who was married to the veteran at any time, providing a child was born of that marriage. The act eliminates the latter provision and includes marriages prior to May 13, 1938, the date of enactment of Public, No. 514.

This section contains the following provisions of the prior law, section 4 of Public, No. 304, Seventy-fifth Congress, August 16, 1937: (1) provisions governing proof of marriage, except that the law of the

place where the ceremony was performed at the time thereof will no longer be for application; (2) the requirement, as to the widow of continuous cohabitation with the person who served from date of marriage to date of death, except where there was a separation which was due to the misconduct of, or procured by, the person who served, without the fault of the widow; and (3) denial of compensation to a widow who has remarried either once or more than once, and where compensation is properly discontinued by reason of remarriage it shall not thereafter be recommenced.

Section 4 repeals sections 1 and 4 of Public, No. 304, Seventy-fifth Congress.

Public, No. 534, May 23, 1938, Independent Offices' Appropriation Act, 1939, provides a total appropriation for the Veterans' Administration of \$547,917,500, made up of the following items: \$93,000,000 for various administrative expenses, including repairs, alteration or improvement of existing facilities; \$112,500 for printing and binding; \$410,000,000 for compensation, pensions, gratuities, and allowances, including emergency officers' retirement pay and annuities; \$40,055,000 for military and naval insurance; \$250,000 for adjusted service and dependent pay; and \$4,500,000 for construction of hospital and domiciliary facilities.

Section 5 of this Act provides as follows:

SECTION 5. No part of any appropriation contained in this Act or authorized hereby to be expended shall be used to pay the compensation of any officer or employee of the Government of the United States, or of any agency the majority of the stock of which is owned by the Government of the United States, whose post of duty is in continental United States unless such person is a citizen of the United States, or a person in the service of the United States on the date of the approval of this act who being eligible for citizenship has filed a declaration of intention to become a citizen or who owes allegiance to the United States.

Public, No. 541, May 24, 1938, "granting pensions and increases of pensions to certain soldiers, sailors, and nurses of the War with Spain, the Philippine Insurrection, or the China Relief Expedition, and for other purposes," provides as follows:

Section 1 provides a pension of \$60 a month to veterans who served 90 days or more in the Spanish-American War, including the Philippine Insurrection and the China Relief Expedition, between April 21, 1898, and July 4, 1902, and have been honorably discharged or who, having served less than 90 days, were discharged for disability incurred in service in line of duty, upon reaching the age of 65 years. The prior service pension rate for Spanish-American War veterans aged 65 was \$30 a month, unless the veteran were disabled, in which case the pension rate ranged from \$20 to \$60 a month, depending upon the degree of disability. The prior law required the attainment of age 75 years to be eligible for \$60 where the pension was based upon age alone.

Section 2 increases the prior rate of \$72, payable if the veteran, as described in the preceding paragraph, is helpless or blind or so nearly helpless or blind as to need or require the regular aid and attendance of another person, to \$100 a month.

Section 3 provides that pensions under the Act shall commence from the date of application therefor, after approval of the act.

Section 4 provides that the act shall not affect or diminish additional pension to those on the Army and Navy Medal of Honor Roll; that pensioners who are inmates of the United States Soldiers' Home or

any national or State soldiers' home shall not be paid more than \$50 a month under the Act while the Government contributes toward defraying the expense incurred in providing such inmates with domiciliary care; and that any pension paid under the act shall be in lieu of any other pension to which a person might be entitled under any other war service pension act.

Section 5 provides that the Act shall not be construed to diminish or reduce any pension heretofore granted.

Public, No. 648, June 16, 1938, amends Veterans Regulation No. 10-Series with respect to two provisions. The first amendment changed the definition of what constitutes incurrence of disease or injury "in line of duty", as set forth in paragraph VIII, Veterans Regulation No. 10-Series. Prior to the amendment a disability incurred while on furlough or leave of absence for a period of time which was considered to interfere materially with the performance of regular duty was not deemed to have been incurred in line of duty. This limitation is removed by Public, No. 648. Incurrence of disability during authorized furlough or leave of absence irrespective of the duration thereof, will not be considered in the same category with disability incurred while on actual duty.

The second amendment changes the definition of "misconduct disability" as contained in paragraph IX, Veterans Regulation No. 10-Series, so as to remove the phrase "other than through the sexual relation" which previously barred payment of pension to a veteran or his dependent by precluding establishment of innocent acquirement of venereal disease through the marital relation.

Public Resolution No. 122, June 21, 1938, the "Work Relief and Public Works Appropriation Act of 1938" contains several provisions relating to veterans.

Section 10, title I, provides that in the employment of persons on emergency relief projects, applicants in actual need whose names have not theretofore been placed on relief rolls shall be given the same eligibility for employment as applicants whose names have heretofore appeared on such rolls, but "that the fact that a person is entitled to or has received either adjusted service bonds or a Treasury check in payment of an adjusted compensation certificate shall not be considered in determining actual need of such employment."

Section 11, title I, provides that first order of preference in employment shall be given to "Veterans of the World War and the Spanish-American War and veterans of any campaign or expedition in which the United States has been engaged (as determined on the basis of the laws administered by the Veterans' Administration) who are in need and are American citizens."

The second paragraph of section 15, title I, grants a preference in retention in Federal employment in the District of Columbia to soldiers, sailors, and marines, their widows, and wives of injured soldiers, sailors, and marines who themselves are not qualified.

Title II, Public Works Administration projects, allots not to exceed \$200,000,000 for four classes of Federal construction projects, one of which is "for hospitals and domiciliary facilities of the Veterans' Administration (including the acquisition of land and sites therefor) and any such allotments shall be available for the purposes and under the conditions specified in the appropriation for 'Hospitals and domiciliary facilities' in the Independent Offices Appropriation Act, 1939."

Public, No. 697, June 22, 1938, provides that members of the Navy and Marine Corps who enlisted between April 21, 1898, and July 4, 1902, and who were discharged for fraudulent enlistment because of minority or misrepresentation of age and who were otherwise entitled to honorable discharge, shall be held and considered to have been honorably discharged from the Navy or Marine Corps on the date of actual separation therefrom. Members of the Army similarly situated were granted similar relief by Public, No. 108, Seventy-fifth Congress, May 25, 1937.

Public, No. 723, June 25, 1938, Second Deficiency Appropriation Act, fiscal year 1938, appropriates \$15,730.25 for payment of judgments and authorized claims affecting the Veterans' Administration.

Section 206 of this act contains a provision similar to Section 5, Public, No. 534, Seventy-fifth Congress, May 23, 1938, previously quoted.

Public, No. 732, June 25, 1938, providing for the creation, organization, administration, and maintenance of a Naval Reserve and a Marine Corps Reserve, contains a provision in section 304 which affects the Veterans' Administration. That section, after extending to any member of the Naval Reserve who is physically injured in line of duty while performing active military or naval service, or to the beneficiaries of any such Reservist who dies as the result of such physical injury the benefits prescribed by law for civil employees of the United States who are physically injured in the line of duty or who die as a result thereof, provides:

That where a person who is eligible for the benefits prescribed by this section is also eligible for pension under the provisions of the Act of June 23, 1937, entitled "An Act to amend the provisions of the pension laws for peacetime service to include Reserve officers and members of the enlisted Reserves" (50 Stat. 305), he shall elect which benefit he shall receive, and for the purposes of this section and of said Act all members of the Naval Reserve shall be considered as performing active military or naval service while performing active duty with or without pay, training duty with or without pay, drills, equivalent instruction or duty, appropriate duty, or other prescribed duty, or while performing authorized travel to or from such duties.

The act of June 23, 1937, (Pub., No. 159, 75th Cong.), cited in the foregoing quotation amends Veterans Regulation No. 1 (a), part II, paragraph I (a), governing eligibility for peacetime service-connected disability or death in line of duty to provide that active service, including service for training purposes, performed by a Reserve officer or member of the Enlisted Reserves of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps, shall be considered as active service for the purposes of granting pension under part II of Veterans Regulation No. 1 (a), as amended.

Public, No. 734, June 25, 1938, is designed to facilitate the disposition of property left by deceased veterans on premises used as Veterans' Administration facilities and to eliminate certain difficulties, delays, and expenses heretofore incurred in the disposition of such property.

Section 1 provides that if a person dies in a Veterans' Administration facility, leaving a will probated under the law of his domicile or of the place where the facility is located, the personal property of such decedent situated at the facility shall vest in the person or persons entitled thereto under the provisions of his will.

If the decedent leaves property at the facility not disposed of by will it will vest in the persons entitled to take the same by inheritance under laws of decedent's domicile. This provision does not apply to property to which the United States is entitled, except where such title is divested out of the United States.

Upon demand, the property will be delivered to a qualified administrator, after which neither the United States nor any officer or employee thereof shall be liable therefor.

Sections 2 to 7, inclusive, deal with assets left or found on the premises of a soldiers' home, a hospital, or a facility now under the jurisdiction of the Veterans' Administration, either of known or unknown ownership. These sections provide an expeditious method of transferring possession of property left or found on a facility to the person previously designated by the deceased or to certain classes of relatives under varying circumstances as to the existence or non-existence of administration and cover cases where a decedent left a will as well as those in which he did not and sale of unclaimed property and disposition of the proceeds thereof. The provisions are made applicable to property on hand at the date of enactment as well as that subsequently left or found in facilities. They apply to all property of the decedent which is on the reservation. The sections also apply to any property left or found on the reservation. Provision is made for notice to be given in the manner prescribed.

Section 8 provides for the relinquishment to the States, Territories, insular possessions, or dependencies of the United States of jurisdiction pertaining to the administration of estates of decedents as may have been ceded to the United States by such authorities respecting the Federal reservation on which is situated any Veterans' Administration facility.

Section 9 defines the term "Veterans' Administration facility" as used in this act.

Section 10 authorizes the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs to promulgate regulations to effectuate the provisions of the act. Decisions of the Administrator, or anyone acting for him, shall not be reviewable administratively by any other officer of the United States.

Public, No. 758, June 28, 1938, provides that dependents of members of the armed forces who served prior to April 21, 1898 (commencement of Spanish-American War), who died while in such military service or by reason of disease or disability incurred therein, shall receive pensions at the rates provided by paragraph III, Part II, Veterans Regulation No. 1-Series. These rates apply to dependents of persons who served subsequent to April 21, 1898, during other than a war period.

Public, No. 774, June 29, 1938, "to provide for a national cemetery in every State," authorizes the Secretary of War to accept on behalf of, and without cost to, the United States, from any State title to such land as he deems suitable for national cemetery purposes. Upon acquisition of the land, the Secretary would be authorized to establish thereon a national cemetery and to provide for its care and maintenance.

INTERPRETATIVE LAW

During the year approximately 1,073 formal and precedent opinions were rendered interpreting the provisions of the various laws granting benefits to veterans and their dependents and the laws governing

administrative activities embracing contracts, property, fiscal matters, personnel, etc. Of these opinions 66 pertain to pensions, 59 to compensation rights, 107 to insurance benefits, 62 to medical treatment, domiciliary care, and hospitalization in veterans' hospitals, 37 to adjusted compensation, 3 to emergency officers' retirement, 6 to claims of creditors, 24 to questions on burial, 435 to questions of marriage and divorce, 38 to legitimacy of children, 32 to furnishing information, 23 to recognition of attorneys and attorneys' fees, and 181 to questions of administration, contracts, property damage, and other miscellaneous matters.

In addition, 6,643 memorandum opinions, etc., were prepared.

In passing upon applications of admission to practice before the Administration during the fiscal year 1938 the following matters were completed: 474 applications of attorneys were approved and 37 denied, 2 applications of agents were approved and 10 denied.

Civil litigation.—Thirty suits were disposed of as follows: 1 suit filed in the Court of Claims for balance due on contract, judgment for plaintiff; 2 suits for damages, 1 against Administration official for personal injuries, judgment for plaintiff; 1 against Administration official for personal injuries, dismissed; 2 injunctions, 1 suit to restrain payment of pension money into pension fund, dismissed, 1 suit for injunction and appointment of receiver, dismissed; 1 mandatory injunction, suit for pension money due veteran's estate, dismissed; 7 mandamus suits, dismissed; 10 recovery suits, 1 to recover erroneous payments of compensation, judgment for plaintiff, 1 to recover overpayment of insurance, dismissed, 4 to recover adjusted service certificates erroneously issued, dismissed, 1 to recover insurance payments made in error, dismissed, 1 to recover insurance due veteran's estate, dismissed, 1 to recover damages for failure to complete contract, dismissed, 1 to recover proceeds under adjusted service certificate, dismissed; 6 recovery—post fund cases, to recover pension money deposited in Post Fund, dismissed; 1 subrogation, suit for personal injuries, dismissed.

Criminal prosecution.—In addition to directing investigations through field offices, the Veterans' Administration cooperates with the several investigating agencies of the Government in developing the facts concerning possible violations of law. The evidence in cases developed solely by the Veterans Administration is submitted to the Department of Justice with a brief of the facts and law for the consideration of the appropriate United States attorney. Cases developed in cooperation with the Federal Bureau of Investigation of the Department of Justice or the Secret Service Division of the Treasury Department are by those agencies submitted to the appropriate United States attorneys. The Veterans' Administration, however, cooperates with the United States attorneys in the further handling of the cases upon request of the Department of Justice.

When requested by the Department of Justice, the Veterans' Administration prepares tentative forms of indictments covering offenses committed in connection with Veterans' Administration activities and cooperates in making a research of the laws. The major portion of the offenses involved are covered by penal provisions within the several acts administered by the Veterans' Administration, but where these statutes do not cover a particular offense, the case is prepared

under the appropriate provision of the Federal Criminal Code or other applicable Federal penal statute.

There were pending in the Veterans' Administration on June 30, 1937, 288 cases which were in the course of consideration and investigation. During the fiscal year, 539 complaints of violations of laws were received, considered, and investigated, which, with the number on hand, made a total of 827 cases. Two hundred and forty-two of these cases were submitted to the Department of Justice for consideration of United States attorneys and 408 were closed without reference to the Department of Justice on account of the lack of evidence, expiration of the period of the statute of limitations, and so forth. A total of 177 cases remained in the course of investigation on June 30, 1938.

There were pending in the Department of Justice on June 30, 1937, a total of 261 cases. There were submitted during the fiscal year 242 cases, making a total of 503 cases. Of these, 266 were disposed of by the Department of Justice, leaving a balance on June 30, 1938, of 237 cases.

In explanation it may be stated that the 97 cases closed by the Department of Justice were cases wherein it was believed that, on account of mitigating circumstances, a successful prosecution would not be obtained. Nevertheless, there having been a prima facie showing of guilt, the Veterans' Administration took the position that the proper enforcement branch of the Government should consider the evidence.

GUARDIANSHIP

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1938, there was no Federal legislation directly affecting the guardianship program; however, several States enacted legislation with more specific provisions respecting trust investments.

The number of ~~beneficiaries~~ beneficiaries under guardianship remained practically stationary—85,977 on July 1, 1937, and 85,865 on June 30, 1938. Minors decreased from 43,040 to 42,651, but incompetents increased from 42,937 to 43,214.

These beneficiaries' estates received during the year a total of \$45,454,906.51 through payments and earnings, approximately one-half million less than in the preceding fiscal year. The total amount of such estates increased, however, over 12 million dollars to a total of \$156,870,857.23. Illegal investments of over 1 million were decreased to \$670,744.08.

Actual cash collections for beneficiaries totalled \$545,118.99; and for the Government—escheated funds and repayments—\$68,310.17.

In two cases—*Hines v. Lowry (In re Garmes)* 300 N. Y. S. 603, Ibid 1344 and *Hines v. Copsey (In re Copsey)* 76 Pac. (2d) 691 (Adv.)—the State courts allowed attorney fees notwithstanding the provisions of Section 500, World War Veterans' Act on the basis of the decision of the Supreme Court in the case of *Hines v. Stein*, 298 U. S. 94. In the *Garmes case*, involving a fee of \$1,500, the Supreme Court granted certiorari May 23, 1938. In the *Copsey case*, involving a fee of \$4,000, certiorari was denied, the Supreme Court of California having remanded the cause for determination of a reasonable fee. The pending case, which doubtless will be decided during the next term, will establish an important precedent respecting fees in guardianship cases

APPEALS

At the expiration of this fiscal year, there were appeals pending in 12,854 cases. This represents a reduction from 19,081 in the pending load as of June 30, 1937. Of the appeals pending on June 30, 1938, 4,703 were physically before the Board of Veterans' Appeals for consideration; 306 had been recalled and were pending receipt by the Board; 2,008 had been certified as ready for appellate consideration and were awaiting recall, and 5,315 were pending development and certification by the agencies of original jurisdiction. Under the procedure obtaining, when an appeal is filed it is incumbent upon the agency having custody of the file, together with the veteran or his representatives, to certify that the evidence has been fully developed and that no further evidence is available material to the question at issue. The responsibility for the actual development of the evidence rests with the agency of original jurisdiction.

During the fiscal year, appellate action was taken on 42,553 issues, involving 20,944 appellants, the ratio of decisions to appellants being 2.03. Despite the care used in the development of the evidence by agencies of original jurisdiction, it was found to be necessary to remand 1,589 cases for further development and in many instances the Board of Veterans' Appeals undertook the indicated additional development.

As of June 30, 1938, formal hearings were pending in 1,093 of the cases actually before the Board of Veterans' Appeals. The volume of pending hearings was greatly reduced during the fiscal year through the cooperation between the field agencies and accredited representatives in holding recorded hearings in the field for submission to the Board of Veterans' Appeals. During the fiscal year, 7,349 formal hearings were held before the Board of Veterans' Appeals.

The appeals disposed of during the fiscal year involved benefits to veterans of all wars and the regular establishment and their dependents under the various laws administered by the Veterans' Administration. For an analysis by wars and kind of claim, see table 52.

PERSONNEL

On June 30, 1938, there were on the rolls of the Veterans' Administration 36,434 employees (exclusive of those on a per diem and per hour basis) whose aggregate gross annual salaries, including allowances, totaled \$59,874,159 as compared with 35,190 employees and \$58,445,240 in annual salaries on June 30, 1937, a net increase of 1,244 employees and \$1,428,919 in aggregate annual salaries. This increase in personnel was due almost entirely to the operation of additional hospital and domiciliary facilities, the beds for these purposes having increased 4,570 and 573 respectively during this fiscal period. Of the total personnel on the rolls at the close of this fiscal year, 5,029 were assigned to central office and 31,405 to field stations located in 47 States, the District of Columbia, and insular offices.

In making new appointments and in effecting discontinuances, the policy of extending preference to ex-service employees has been carefully followed. The same preference has been extended in filling vacancies in staff positions. At the close of this year 71.99 percent of the male and 12.49 percent of the female employees on the rolls of the Veterans' Administration were ex-service, while 51.69 percent of the total personnel had such status.

The foregoing figures include member employees in Veterans' Administration facilities. On June 30, 1938, there were 1,528 member employees receiving aggregate annual salaries of \$737,064.

During July 1937 the Veterans' Administration and the United States Civil Service Commission reached an agreement whereby disabled veterans hospitalized or domiciled in Veterans' Administration facilities could receive the necessary training therein to prepare for the civil-service examinations given for the positions of telephone and elevator operators. During this year 151 veterans took advantage of this opportunity.
