Three core federal grant programs provide emergency preparedness guidance and funding



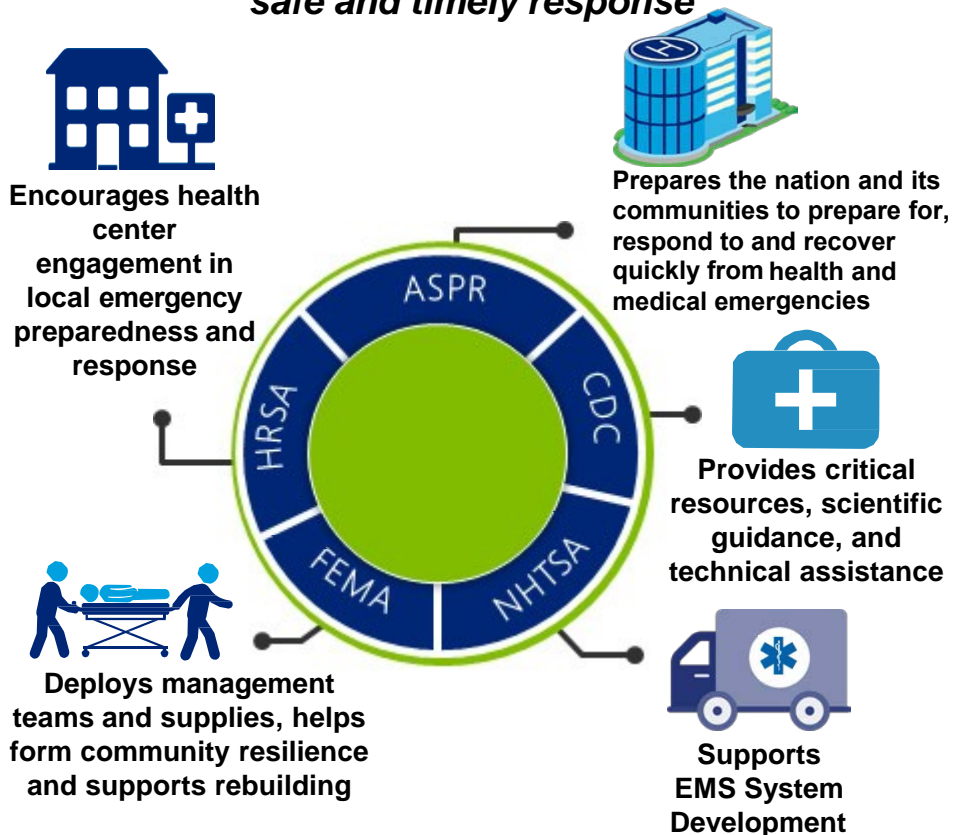
\$1.5B in grant federal funding leveraged annually to strengthen emergency preparedness

Over 200 grant awardees including states, localities, territories and freely associated states

When a health emergency occurs, increased support is needed across agencies to coordinate a safe and timely response

Emergency personnel and volunteers are fully trained to provide care and safety for all



Emergency equipment and supplies are in place to prepare every community for an emergency response



Communications, patient transport and recovery procedures are established to ensure community safety
